Jewelry Tips

PICKLE PROBLEMS

Dropping a hot item into the pickle after soldering causes a hiss that sends small droplets of the acid pickle into the air. This will rust your nearby tools and can't be all that good to breathe either. My solution is to use a coffee cup of water next to my solder block to quench the piece and then decide if I want to drop it in the pickle.

Also, a hot pickle pot gives off fumes that bother me in my home workshop. I get around that by using my pickle cold. I mix it a little stronger than with a hot pot so that it works just as quickly. I keep it in a large-mouth peanut butter bottle and cap it off whenever I'm done using it.

PROTECTING FINISHED SURFACES

I figure that any accidental scratch I make on a piece means about 15 minutes of extra sanding and polishing. So after finishing major surfaces, I typically cover them with some masking tape to avoid any scratches when doing final work like cleanups and setting of stones. The blue masking tape used by painters is best because it doesn't leave a sticky residue when removed.

My Summer Vacation to Montana, Day One

I read Doug Renken's summary of our vacation trip to Montana and I thought maybe I should enhance on our trip.

Our original planned trip was to include other dear friends from the club, Tom & Lillie Rogers, Dan & Diane Stevens and Gene & Joann Alvey. Unfortunately Tom had to have cataract surgery during our planned time line and Diane ended up having knee surgery. Joann was not feeling well at the time so they opted out of the trip as well. Happily the surgeries turned out very well for our friends and Joann is feeling better.

Doug and Willa had agreed to leave Boise on Friday, September 10th, around 4:00pm. I had managed to get off from work around 1:00pm to get my usual last minute things done. I meet Doug and Willa at the Black's Creek east bound on ramp of I-84 promptly at 4:00. I know Tom is probably laughing right now because he knows I am always late to everything. Believe it or not I was there waiting before Doug arrived. One of the last minute items I stopped to pick up was at the local dollar store. While I was standing in line I spied hanging on the rack at the checkout counter a twin pack of tweezers. Those that know me very well, know that I am a magnate for ticks. So I grabbed two packages of the twin pack of tweezers as a precaution.

We always travel with Motorola hand held radios whether traveling in our trucks or hiking on a rock trip just in case someone has a problem. Doug mentioned they had talked to Jan Smith the day before and were expecting a call back from her sometime tonight. While driving on the road some place between Arco and Dubois, Doug says they received the call from Jan. The Helena Club was meeting at the dock at 9:30am tomorrow. The club would provide the ride in the boat to the club claim. The only thing we needed was tweezers and a bucket. An odd combination I thought, but oh well. All the other tools would be provided at the club claim. Jan said if we decided to go, to meet at her house and they would show us how to get there. Doug handed the radio to Willa who said it was too bad we didn't have any tweezers with us. I started to laugh to myself. I told her not to worry that I could cover the tweezers. She asked what we would put the sapphires in if we found any. Again I started to laugh to myself. I said I could cover that as well. I had taken some of my old film containers out of my camera bag about a month ago and had put them in my rock toolbox. Doug said if we drive all night we could probably get there around 1:00am. They wanted to know if I wanted to give it a try. I told them it was a sign that we were destined to go. Let's drive as far as we can and see how long we last. Normally I drive last but I was in the lead. A good thing, if I slowed down Doug was there to push me along. We stopped in Butte, Montana for gas, something to keep us awake and a bathroom stop. We started to see deer along the road shortly out of Butte. This made me slow down just a bit. We got to Helena a little before 1:00am with only one turn around. A glitch in directions Doug had received. We arrived at the Marina at Canyon Ferry, where we were going to camp for the duration of the time we were going to spend in the Helena area. After calling the person in charge of the Marina and waking her up from a sound sleep, we just pulled off to the side out of the way to settle down for the night. I was so tired; I dropped my driver's seat back to recline, pulled my quilt over me and went to sleep.

We got up and grab ourselves something quick to eat (instant oatmeal). We waited for the lady in charge of the Marina to arrive so we could move our rigs into the correct camp sites. I grabbed my old back pack which had my gloves and an estwing rock hammer in it. I grab two bottles of Gatorade and a couple of power bars and threw them into the back pack. I gave two tweezers to Willa and put two in my blue jeans pocket. I grabbed three black & gray film canisters and gave them to Willa so she could cut an X in the cap top. The lady in charge of the marina finally arrived shortly after 8:00 and showed us where to move our rigs. Around 8:30 we headed for Jan and Kurt's house. Doug was not quit awake for he drove past the turn toward Jan's house but fortunately there was a second access road that leads toward her house along the lake. As we were getting close to her house, Jan & Kurt were coming down the road in their SUV. We pulled into their driveway, parked in the appropriate spots, hopped out of our trucks and threw everything we wanted to take into Jan's SUV. So there

we were the five of us flying down the road toward the spot where everyone from the Helena Club was to meet. Did I mention that Doug, Willa and I had joined the Helena Club the month before? We arrived at the lake a tad before 9:30 thanks to Jan's perfect driving. We unloaded our items and headed toward the dock where two boats were waiting. The one boat on the right was already full of people and about to depart the dock. The boat at the end of the dock had two ladies and one fellow already in it. The lady in the second boat yelled we need two more people to hop in so we can head out. I was standing next to Jan so the two of us headed for the boat. I got to the end of the dock first so I stepped into the boat first. Now it's important to understand that I am not a water person and the few times I've been on a lake it's been in something slightly larger than the aluminum boat I found myself sitting in. We were provided life preservers' to wear. I sat my backpack on the bottom of the boat next to my feet with the buckets sitting behind us in the front of the boat where one of the ladies was sitting. Jan sat next to me in the middle of the boat with the two of us facing the back toward the fellow who was controlling the boat. We left the dock heading toward the middle of the lake that takes a bend toward the right. The speed from which we were moving was a very safe trolling speed. After a short distance there was a sign saying this was a no wake zone. We didn't have to worry about that. We had been moving for some time when one of the ladies sitting behind us said there is a whole in the boat up here and we are taking on water. I looked at Jan and she at me. I looked at my feet and noticed there was water pooling up at our feet. I picked up my backpack and sat it on my lap. I glanced at the shoreline trying to determine my options. Mentally I am calculating if I could make it to shore and if the back pack would be too much weight. It's my old pack so that would be no loss since I had taken everything out and had transferred it to my new pack I planned to use the next day at the Sally Ann Claim. I just didn't want to lose my rock hammer and gloves. I put my finger in the water to determine how cold it was. Oh my, it was cold. We trolled on making the bend in the lake with me still calculating all the time. I was looking down into the water. I could see the rocks moving closer to the surface of the water. I looked back toward the fellow driving the boat and he seemed unconcerned about the rocks near the surface. At this point the shore was very close so I was confident I could dog paddle to shore at this distance. After what seemed quite awhile we made toward the far dock which belongs to the club. We pulled up in amongst a heavy moss growing in the water on the left side of the dock. The fellow said to stay on the left side of the dock and to be careful were we walked. He didn't need to tell me twice, I hurried to shore. Jan handed me my bucket and said we needed to fill it with water from the lake and we had to haul it up to the claim about half a mile from the shoreline. There were tubs waiting for us to screen the sapphire material in but it needed water and there was no water source up where the claim area was located. The hike up the hill was not far but I have to admit I am far from being in shape. I stopped several times. We were almost there when a lady many years my senior came up from behind me carrying two buckets nearly full of water to shame me for my bucket was only a little over half full and smaller than what she was toting. When we got to the top where the claims start Wayne was there waiting for us. He emptied part of the water into a black tub. He then moved on toward the left with the remainder of the water with us following him like his new found puppies. He explained how he needed us to dig and where he wanted the over burden placed. He showed us what level in the gravel the sapphires where found. It made perfect sense to me so off we started to dig the top over burden off and our hunt for those beautiful blue, blue green, to green colored stones started. Wayne spent the whole morning showing us how to wash and screen the gravel. After what seemed a long time, Willa, Doug and Kurt finally show up. I asked them what boat ferried them to the dock. They said one of the boats was not being used so it was taking longer for everyone to get to the claim area. I nodded my head and smiled. We dug, sifted and washed our gravel for several hours. I have several small sized stones. I believe everyone around us found something.

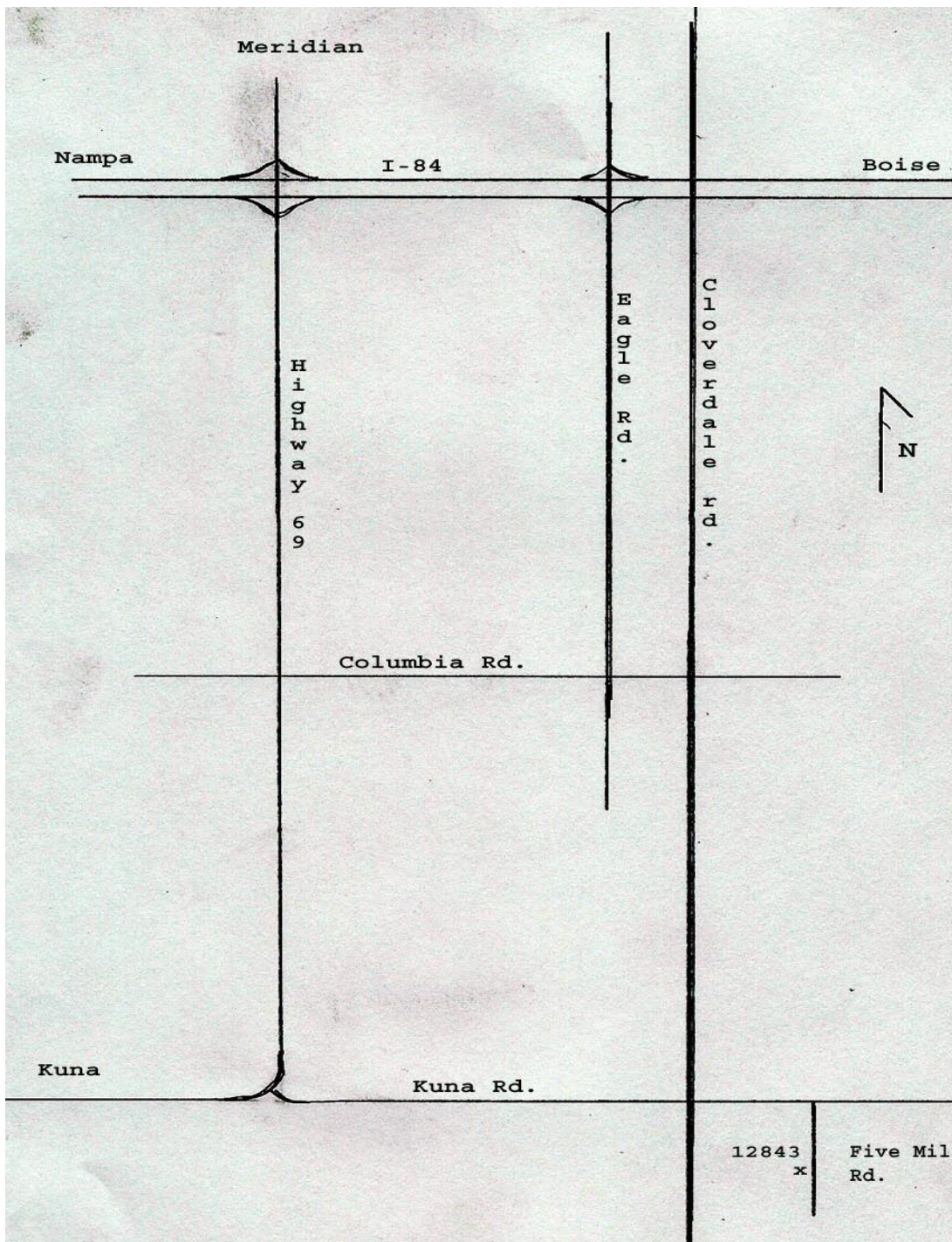


Workshop Report

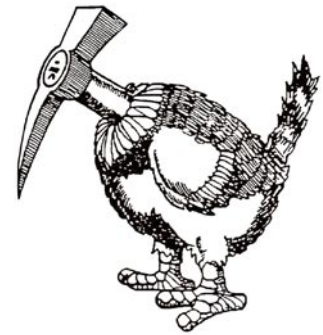
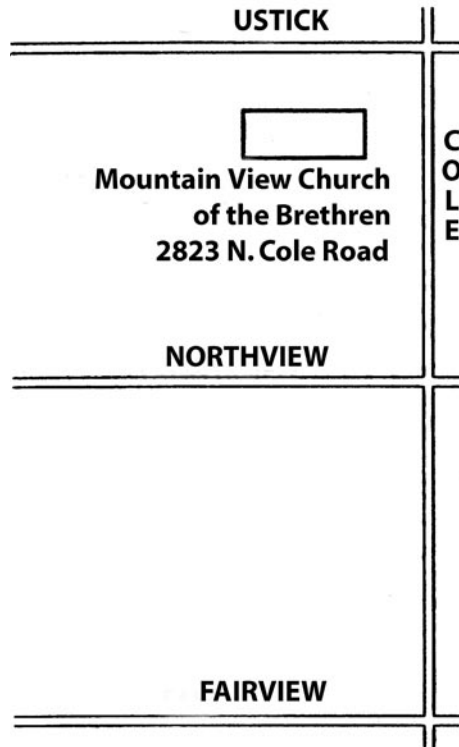
