Show: Bills from the show were received, processed and will be delivered on Wednesday.

Tables: Replacement of the wooden tables was heavily discussed. Replacement with lighter more durable plastic tables is favored. Expense could be offset by selling old wooden tables and putting proceeds towards new plastic tables- but will be discussed further. Willa suggested that we adjust the budget to buy new tables over a period of 3 years. I set up a small area for the kids to buy quartz crystals I dug up from Crystal Park, Montana, a few years ago with a small geode from either Beacon Hill or Succor Creek to accompany the quartz crystals. My trip to Tueson and the Gem Show

I left on Sunday, February 7, 2010 to drive to Tucson, Arizona to attend the Gem and Mineral Show and visit my brother David in Cascabel, Arizona. It's a long drive by yourself! I'd originally planned to take my brother Alan along with me, but his recovery from cancer surgery and chemotherapy (brain and lung cancer) is a very long, slow process and he wasn't up to the trip. I drove through Las Vegas and stayed at a casino in Boulder City on Sunday night and then drove on down to Tucson on Monday, arriving at about 4 pm. My brother had arranged housing for me in a "straw bale" building (covered in stucco) that he shares "ownership" with several other folks so it only cost me \$5 a night. It had some kitchen facilities, a TV, a bed, a bathroom, refrigerator so it was more than adequate!

On Monday, I found a map of Tucson and made my way to the Visitor's Center to find some information about the "show." Well, I got a lot of information – and there's a LOT of places to visit. Fortunately, I was only a short way away from one of the sites and the folks at the visitor's center directed me to the JG&M Expo on Simpson Street. There were quite a few vendors there and they did sell to the public so I enjoyed wandering thru the site looking at incredible amethyst cathedrals and massive slices of Arizona petrified wood (collected from about 30 feet underground) and trunks, etc., along with kopal, beads, turquoise, and many other beautiful gems and minerals.

They also offered free shuttle service to other sites, so I caught one to Howard Johnson, La Quinta Inn, Days Inn, etc., and wandered through those vendor sites for the rest of the day (I walked thru 8 or so sites around Speedway/Drachman/Grant Street for about 5 hours). The number of vendors was incredible and the minerals, stones, fossils, etc. were also incredible. Many vendors sold only to dealers and the sites/routes weren't very clear but they still let me wander through to look. Many vendors at the hotels displayed and sold their materials directly out of their hotel rooms. I finally caught back up with the shuttle and made my way back to the Simpson Street site and drove back to my lodgings about 6 pm when the sites closed for the day.

On Wednesday, my brother arrived from Cascabel (26 miles N into the cacti (deep woods) from Benson, Arizona, and I showed him the Simpson Street site and then we caught the shuttle to the sites on the West side of the freeway - just seemed like miles and miles of vendors/tents/material. So, we walked around there for awhile and a huge wind storm swooped in and it started to rain really hard and we got cold and wet so caught the shuttle back to the Simpson site and went "home" to dry off and warm up.

On Thursday, David went home and I went to the Tucson Convention Center to the Tucson Gem and Mineral Show. Once again, there were a lot of vendors but this time they all sold to the public! And, there were many beautiful cases, art work, moon rocks, etc. on display. I also saw Allan Young!!!! The whole show was beautiful!

Later that afternoon, I drove about 2 ½ hours further south to Benson and then another 26 miles NE to Cascabel (close to the Saguaro Wilderness) which is out in the deep "cactus boonies" to stay with my brother for the night. It's an interesting site and he makes huge gongs out of old propane/gas cylinders there along with his other steel/metal work hobbies. Another of the co-owners of the site has her own house there but has used the straw bales as the base for a stucco wall around the patio area to keep out snakes and other critters.

I left Friday afternoon and drove to Kingman, Arizona and stayed overnight there. On the way, I passed two really bad traffic accidents which slowed traffic to a crawl (in the first a train had slammed into a pickup truck; and there were at least 4 vehicles in the 2nd wreck). I got to Las Vegas in time to get trapped in traffic jam just outside of Vegas on Highway 93. It seemed the cops were diverting traffic in a circle so I went around from Las Vegas Blvd to the Northern Beltway (215) and back around and there were several hundred vehicles in the same loop so there must have been a bad accident on Highway 93 North just past that intersection. We were all trapped there a couple of hours and it didn't look like they were opening it up anytime soon so I looked at my map and Highway 95 looked like it went North so I found it and went West on 215 to Highway 95 and went west and north to Tonopah and then East and North to Ely and stayed overnight at the Hotel Nevada in Ely. I made it back home safe and sound about 4:00 pm on Sunday the 14th.

It was a long but interesting trip. If I go again, I will try to find more information about the various gem show sites before I go—there are so many and I only saw a few but it's nice to be home!









Workshop Report
