
Charles is the winner of our 2011 Grand Prize Amethyst Geode

What is Soil? Vegetation

> Horizon B - (Subsoil or Light Soil) Zone of Accumulation

Horizon C - Partially decomposed parent

Unaltered Bedrock

We have a working knowledge of what is and what is not soil. We know it as the earthy material that we learned to call dirt when we played in it as children. We marvel at this seemingly lifeless material that gives life to plants. We understand that it is the most basic of building materials and the foundation on which we build structures. Yet, whatever this stuff is, it nearly defies formal definition.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, soil is the collective term for "natural bodies. made up of mineral and organic materials, that cover much of the Earth's surface, contain living matter, and can support vegetation out of doors. Soils have in places been changed by human activity. The upper limit of soil is PAGE 4

air or shallow water." The lower limit of soil is more difficult to define, but it generally coincides with the common rooting depth of native perennial plants. Soils do not cover all of the earth's land. Non-soil land surfaces, which will not grow plants, include the ice lands of polar and high-elevation regions, recent hard lava flows, salt flats, bare rock mountain slopes and ridges, and areas of moving dunes. Engineers generally ignore the biological component of soil and consider soil to be material that can be excavated with a shovel or compacted into roadbeds or other support base. More formally, engineers may consider soil as "rock particles and minerals derived from preexisting rocks

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March Field Trip Report Whang Doodle/Queenstone

When: March 19th 2011 weather depending.

What: We'll be collecting jasper and opalene at Queenstone; common and possibly some fire opal at Whang Doodle

Where: Meet at ION station at the intersection of Hwy 55 and Hwy 95 between 7:00 a.m. and 7:30 a.m. Take Exit 33A (last Nampa exit West of Nampa) cross over the freeway, stay on Karcher Rd, (Hwy 55) and travel past the bridge across the Snake River in Marsing 2.7 miles. Hints & Tips

Bench Tips DENTAL TOOLS

A ready source of free tools is your local dentist. Dental picks can be reworked into wax tools or straightened and sharpened to make a stylus for marking and layout. The steel in these tools is high quality, and the handles are designed for comfort.

A special note however - don't try to bend one of the tips to a different shape - the steel will snap. To change the shape, heat the tip to red hot and bend it with pliers while it's hot.

And don't forget to ask your dentist for some of the cutting burs they throw out. These are useful for a variety of things. It's best to call a week or two before your visit and ask the dentist to put some of these tools aside for you. It's good practice also to ask that they run them through the sterilizer for you.

Templates

Whenever I have to make more than 2-3 exact copies of anything, I think of making a template. A template lets me easily draw the shape of an item. Art stores sell templates for common shapes like circles, ovals, hearts, etc, but if you need other shapes, it's easy to make your own. Simply cut the shape out of sheet PAGE 8 plastic, copper or brass.

The brass template let's me quickly trace the design of these ginkgo leaf earrings onto silver sheet, and the nickel template makes it easy to drill the silver pin inlay pattern into the ironwood.

What is the Geologic Cycle?

The geologic cycle is a collective term used to describe the complex interactions between the component sub-cycles of tectonic, hydrologic, rock, and the biological cycling of elements known as the biogeochemical cycle. These various subcycles influence each other and may produce natural hazards and processes important to environmental geology such as landslides, earthquakes, volcanic activity, flooding, groundwater flow, and weather. The rock cycle is influenced by all the other geologic subcycles. For example, tectonic processes provide the pressure and heat necessary to recrystalize some or all of the minerals in a rock and transform it from one rock type to another.


