MAGNETIC HOLDER FOR FILES

An easy way to keep all your files organized at the bench is to use a magnetic tool strip. They're not expensive and help keep a lot of small tools from cluttering the bench top. I got a couple of them from Harbor Freight for about \$5 each. See http://www.harborfreight.com/18-inch-magnetic-holder-65489.html

Only regret was putting some of my small drills on the magnets. The drills got a little magnetized and now stick together when I carry them in a bottle in my tool box.

PATTERNS

After sawing patterns there's always a little cleanup to do. Needle files (7-8 inches) can get into the larger areas, and escapement files (4 inches) can get into some of the corners. But I often find myself looking for even smaller files. Couldn't even find them at a watchmaker tools supply company, so I had to try something else. I ended up grinding down the tip of a 4" barrette file using a separating disk (or cutoff wheel) in your Dremel or Foredom.

The wheels are inexpensive and do a great job grinding steel (poor at soft metals like silver). The disks have other uses like modifying pliers and making design stamps. My preference is the one inch diameter ones as shown at:

Be sure to hold the wheel firmly so nothing moves to break the disk, and definitely wear your safety glasses. A flake of steel in your eye makes for a bad day.



Recognition of Ancient, Chalcedony-Filled Spherulites, Or In Search of Ancient Thunder Eggs.

Chalcedony-Filled spherulites or thunder eggs are most commonly associated with welded ash flow tuffs in the John Day and Carno Formations of Miocene age in then Anetlope-Ashwood areas of central, Oregon, where this term is reputedly coined. Pony Butte in Jefferson County may be considered a classic area for these mineralogical phenomena, but contrary to many popular notions, they are not unique in the area. Practically every thunder egg producing site yields unique structured and patterned nodules, but all have several characteristics that are not common to amygdaloidal or sedimentary agates. Classic thunder eggs owe their form and appearance to the fact they are geologically young and have not undergone significant alteration and diagenesis which may significantly change the appearance of the nodule.

Several criteria for recognizing thunder eggs from in situ Paleozoic, Mesozoic, and Tertiary settings and for recognizing orphans in tills and gravels include: (1) a blocky to geometric structure; (2) brecciated nonchalcedoric, rhyolitic inclusions; (3) ridges around the outer surface; (4) impressions of radially arranged quartz and feldspar crystals; (5) plant like inclusions. Although thunder eggs are most commonly associated with Tertiary volcanics of the Pacific Northwest, specimens showing the above criterion have also been found in late Precambrian, Lake Superior regions, USA; the Ordovician of Great Britain; and the Devonian of Australia, just to mention just a few sites.

Recognition of thunder eggs have application in determining volcanic histories of an area as they are common only to ash flow tuffs. When found as orphans, they may shed considerable light as to the source area, source bed, and composition of the rocks from which they were derived.


Electronic Grindings

- 5. Bring rocks and specimens, etc. from your favorite home collecting area to show and swap at the tailgate display. This will be a good time to swap maps, GPS readings and information about your favorite home collecting areas.???
- 6. There are a lot of other rockhounding opportunities within 100 miles of our Rendezvous site: sunstones, opal, petrified wood, other obsidian sites, geodes and more. The Rendezvous is a good way to start your summer collecting tour.


