# Jewelry Tips

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 $\leq$ softer and burnishes over the stone more easily.

Second, you may have trouble matching the shape and size of the stone with the shape and size of the bezel cup. Purchased cups can only be found in a limited number of standard sizes. You may have to adjust your choice of gemstone to match the cup. have fairly low side walls. While these are fine for low-dome stones, they will not adequately secure stones with steep side walls.

Lastly before setting, check the fit of your gemstone in the cup, particularly around the bottom. The bottom corners of a stamped cup are much more rounded than a bezel you would fabricate yourself. This causes a problem with some stones. If your stone has a sharp edge around the bottom, burnishing over the bezel will place a lot of stress on the stone and may cause it to crack. To avoid this, I round off the bottom edge of the stone with a diamond file (or use sandpaper on soft stones).

Sheet Wax with Adhesive

I was shopping in the jewelry district last weekend for supplies for our organic casting class and came upon a new product that may interest some of you. Often I want to increase the thickness of a model by adding a layer of wax on the back side. For instance, models like a leaf or a flower petal do not cast well unless you add a little extra thickness. Problem is trying to apply a coating of wax that's smooth and even.

The new product I found is an easily moldable sheet wax with an adhesive coating. This lets me press a leaf onto it, trim the wax to the leaf shape, and then gently bend the sandwich to the contour I want. The wax is available in a number of different thicknesses from about 26 ga to 14 ga.

# Buchanan Thunder Eggs May 25th through May 28th

First and foremost, EVERYTHING I KNOW IS IN THIS AN-NOUNCEMENT, there is no need to RSVP, so please limit your inquiries to details that are not mentioned here, as I have very limited time and I will just send you this announcement if your questions are answered here. If any of the details change I will send notices out ASAP and post them to the link below.

After a wildly successful trip last September, again Rod, the rancher who owns the famous Buchanan thunderegg beds 20 miles east of Burns, OR will host a weekend dig for all rockhounds! The pits will be open to digging Memorial Day weekend Friday May 25<sup>th</sup> through Monday May 28<sup>th</sup> 2012. Plan on arriving at 8:00 AM for check-in at the gravel pit across the road each morning and getting up to the pits before 9:00 AM. You can dig as long as you like but you must check out and pay for your eggs at the bottom of the hill before dark. We will be digging with hand tools and Rod will be charging \$1.00/pound for eggs you dig and \$1.25/pound for already dug eggs - which is a very reasonable price for these much sought after thundereggs. There will also be many tons of already dug eggs for sale at the bottom of the ridge from each pit so if you can't or don't care to dig you can still shop among eggs from all the pits. We opened five pits last year and plan to have these open, and all will be freshly prepared and ready to dig for the weekend.

Rod is also planning on hosting a FREE BBQ dinner at least Saturday and almost certainly Sunday as well! He along with generous members of some local clubs will be supplying the main dishes so PLEASE bring side dishes and/or desserts, or plan on a donation toward the cost of food to show your appreciation. ANY help is appreciated - if you can bring something to BBQ (as long as it fits on the grill LOL). Also plan on bringing plates and silverware, chairs, and your own favorite beverages.

Access to the beds is by short dirt roads which are suitable for high clearance vehicles or SUVs. Be prepared to carpool since parking at the digs is extremely limited and passenger cars are definitely NOT suited for the road! Digging should be fairly easy; the best tools to bring are a pick, rock hammer, shovel, and buckets. Rod will do his best to get the pits cleaned out with a backhoe to prepare for our digging beforehand; about 5 pits are currently open from last year's trip and should be easy to dig with some cleanout and hand tools. Each of the Buchanan pits contains different types of eggs, so there is a huge variety available. Last year we found many eggs with beautiful pockets filled with fully terminated quartz crystals, lots with spectacular druzy quartz, botryoidal clear agate, some blue and pink opal, zeolite minerals, and other formations. Also eggs with agate "scenes" and fortifications are possible. For a hint of what you can find check out the photos I have posted on the web page above. Believe it or not, much better are available but I don't vet have photos posted.

We'll have signs posted on the road for the camping area and the pits. Dry camping is available across the road from the pits at a large, flat gravel pit area that is suitable for trailers and tenters.

Those wishing for a "wilderness experience" can camp among the bountiful sagebrush anywhere on the rancher's property (ask Rod or myself for directions). Other spots to camp are the Crane Hot Springs resort (electric, water, hot springs!) or the Burns RV park (all services), both less than 30 minutes from the beds. There are also a few BLM camping areas that you can use for a small fee (dry camping is free anywhere you are permitted to drive on BLM land). Other nearby rockhounding areas within an easy drive include Stinkingwater petrified wood, birch limbs and other wood, agate, plume agate, Burns obsidian, fossil leaves, and more.

Once again EVERYONE will be required to sign a liability waiver for the Mt. Hood Rock Club's insurance policy which will cover us in event of an emergency (free of charge). You don't have to be a rock & mineral club member to attend. Print this out and bring this to your next club meeting, email and call all your rockhound friends - we need a good turnout so the ranchers will be happy with the trip and invite us back again!

Here is a list of places to set up and directions.

GPS coordinates of the camp and pits for are: 43.596 N -118.619 W

DIRECTIONS: From Burns: from the east end of town, travel 1 mile northeast on Hwy 395 (the Burns RV park is here on your right). Turn right at the junction with Hwy 20 and proceed exactly 20 miles east to the Buchanan store at milepost 154. Just before the store turn right onto Crane-Buchanan Road. Travel south to a 90 degree left turn after 3 miles. SLOW DOWN, the camp area and dig are less than <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile immediately east of the big hill! If you miss the turn at Buchanan, turn around at the rest area 1 mile to east.

From Crane Hot Springs – the resort is 25 mi. east of Burns, turn right onto Hwy 78 in town to milepost 25. Travel east to the hamlet of Crane, here turn north onto Crane-Buchanan Rd. and follow it just under 13 miles to the camp area & pits.

From Idaho and points east: From Nyssa OR, follow Hwy 20 for 111 miles west to Buchanan, turn left at the store and proceed as above.

### Before You Buy a Magnifier By Andrew Alden, About.com Guide

After you get a rock hammer, you'll need a magnifier. The big Sherlock Holmes type lens is a cliché; instead you want a lightweight, powerful magnifier (also called a loupe) that has impeccable optics and is easy to use. Get the best magnifier for demanding jobs like inspecting gems; in the field, for quick looks at minerals, buy a decent magnifier you can afford to lose.

### **Using a Magnifier**

Hold the lens up next to your eye, then bring your specimen close to it, only a few centimeters from your face. The point is to focus your attention *through* the lens, the same way you look through eyeglasses. If you normally wear glasses, you may want to keep them on. A magnifier won't correct for astigmatism.

### How Many X?

The X factor of a magnifier refers to how much it magnifies. Sherlock's magnifying glass makes things look 2 or 3 times bigger; that is, it's 2x or 3x. Geologists like to have 5x to 10x, but more than that is hard to use in the field because the lenses are very small. 5x or 7x lenses offer a wider field of vision, while a 10x magnifier gives you the closest look at tiny crystals, trace minerals, grain surfaces, and microfossils.

### **Magnifier Flaws to Watch For**

Check the lens for scratches. Set the magnifier on a piece of white paper and see if the lens adds color of its own. Now pick it up and examine several objects, including one with a fine pattern like a halftone picture. The view through the lens should be clear as air with no internal reflections. Highlights should be crisp and brilliant, with no colored fringes (that is, the lens should be achromatic). A flat object should not look warped or buckled—move it to and

fro to be sure. A magnifier should not be loosely put together.

### **Magnifier Bonuses**

Given the same X factor, a larger lens is better. A ring or loop to attach a lanyard is a good thing; so is a leather or plastic case. A lens held with a removable retaining ring can be taken out for cleaning. And a brand name on the magnifier, while not always a guarantee of quality, means you can contact the manufacturer.

### **Doublet, Triplet, Coddington**

Good lens makers combine two or three pieces of glass to correct for chromatic aberration—what gives an image blurred, colored fringes. Doublets can be quite satisfactory, but the triplet is the gold standard. Coddington lenses employ a deep cut inside the solid glass, using an air gap to create the same effect as a triplet. Being solid glass, they cannot ever come apart—a consideration if you get wet a lot.

## HB 2600: Rock Collecting on State Lands

Republican Representative Barbara Bailey (10th Legislative District--north of King County and including much of Island County) introduced a bill that would allow rockhounding on DNR, WDFW, and State Park lands with collecting rules similar to those of the BLM. At a public hearing of the Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources on January 27th, a contingent of rockhounds attended and some spoke. This is a summary of that meeting, which your editor attended:

It was a full hearing room because of the public interest in the four bills that were being heard. The rockhounding bill was first, thank goodness, but the testimony was not very heartening. The most eloquent speaker for the proponents was a member of a flintknapper club who had a display of their creations and gave the committee a display keep. However, most of the testimonial time was consumed by the three state departments (State Parks, DNR, and WDFW) who were very aggressive in opposing the bill. According to the bill's primary sponsor, Rep. Barbara Bailey, this was highly irregular (she was blindsided) as there should have been dialogue between her and these agencies prior to the hearing. The committee members asked good guestions of the state folks, making it obvious that the departments were hostile to rockhounding. It did not help our cause that one proponent made dubious statements: the average age of a rockhounder is 65 and many rockhounds didn't know how to dress for the hearing and therefore were not in attendance.

Subsequently, the bill was revised to limit collecting to DNR lands and to modify the collecting limits and restrictions. However, the DNR claimed that it would cost the state millions of dollars to perform cultural surveys of their lands. [*Gregg! Here's a job for you.*] The bill was passed on to the Ways and Means Committee, which held a public hearing on February 6th. Once again, Representative Bailey made a good case for us. Stay tuned to learn about its ultimate fate.

One positive outcome is that some legislators are now aware of the rockhounding hobby (as opposed to the more serious gold miners using more than hand tools) and, maybe, that the state falls behind other states and federal agencies in allowing rock collecting for personal pleasure.

# Rockhound "CODE OF ETHIC

I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner. I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing

collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with field trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my club or Federation officer, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources. I will observe the "Golden Rule", I will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.
