Continued Board Meeting March 2nd, 2016

Old business: The 2016 Idaho Gem Show was discussed at length. Several points were covered:

The new money handling forms used this year seemed to help and will be refined for next year.

Everyone thought the cases were especially nice this year and the awards were appreciated. Brent plans to expand this program for next year. Deana suggested maybe the juniors could make posters or something to dress up the ends. With Aaron planning to be away next year Brent will need someone to help with the cases and black light display.

It was pointed out that with a new person handling the name tags this year things were a little disorganized.

With floor space at the venue at a premium several ideas were discussed to maximize for next year: various arrangements of booth location and alternative booths discussed as well as better signage to move folks through the congested areas easier. Some booths could be made smaller or combined with each other to free space needed elsewhere. Further discussion needed before next year.

The raffle, hourly drawings and the grand prize drawing seemed to go well this year. It was suggested that next year we could try door tickets for hourly drawing only with grand prize tickets being sold and see how that compares with this year. Brent said it looks like the donations for raffle will increase for next year and thinks this booth may need additional room.

The new table coverings and skirting turned out awesome this year. Special attention to the demonstration and silent auction tables will be given next year to prevent excessive wear and cleaning. Disposable plastic clothes for those tables were used this year and noted for use next year.

As previously discussed, the grab bag table ran out of bags very early on Saturday. More bags need to be put together next year as this is a very popular booth. To remedy this Willa has suggested the club purchase several large tumblers to be placed with various members already identified and have them tumble material. Willa has done the research here and has found a source for 4 25lb commercial grade tumblers at the cost of \$613.00 each. After considerable discussion on the matter, Willa proposed a motion that the purchase of 2 25lb tumblers, at the cost of \$613.00, for a total purchase of \$1226.00, be put into the budget. The motion was seconded by Dave Douglas, voted on and passed by the board. (Gene Alby agrees to continue to handle passing out supplies to those members who want to tumble additional material at home with a contest to encourage this being mentioned. Also, the donation of a very large tumbler, to be placed in the workshop (as soon as it's finished), will be available for tumbling even more material).

It was pointed out that several dealers (this year and in the past) either brought their own or got extra tables (or used their back tables) to increase sale space. Some dealers were able to create more footage in their booth than was paid for by doing this. It was agreed that all the dealer's booths need to be set up based on the same system to ensure equal opportunity. Therefore, after considerable discussion on the matter, to better manage this issue, Willa proposed a motion supporting a change be made to the wording in the Dealer Contract with new footage and rates regarding back tables to allow one backup table per 24' booth and two backup tables per booth 32' and greater. Motion was seconded by Brent Stewart, voted on and passed by the Board.

Overall, everyone thought the Show was a great success this year and appreciated all the hard work from the members! Thanks everyone. A pizza party for those who were involved in setting up and tearing down will be held on Friday, April 1st at Idaho Pizza Company at 6:30pm. Details to be confirmed at next meeting.

Dana reviewed the new member applications after which Willa proposed a motion to accept the new applicants for membership. Motion was seconded by Ed Moser, voted on and passed by the Board.

Meeting adjourned at 9:30pm

Idaho Gem Club Experiences in Attracting (and Retaining) New Members By Philip S. Neuhoff, Ph.D. Outgoing President, Idaho Gem Club, Inc.

Northwest Federation President Hidemi Kira set me a note a little while ago commenting on our club's strong membership gains in the last year and asking if I could share how we accomplished such a feat. To be honest, I have rarely counted our members during my time on our Board of Directors and as President. Like Hidemi, I was surprised when I saw the data...our club had grown from just under 200 members to nearly 400 in one year. I was also pleased, as like most clubs, we work hard to recruit and retain new members.

In part, our strength in numbers is partially a function of good circumstances. The Idaho Gem Club, Inc. is one of the oldest clubs in the country, and we have a long history of contributions to the hobby. We are located in an area with abundant collecting opportunities, and through the club's history we have protected some of the more storied localities for collecting by claiming them (examples include the Whangdoodle opal deposit, the Beacon Hill agate nodule locality, portions of the Graveyard Point agate district, and the Queenstone jasper deposit). We are also situated in a reasonably large Metropolitan Statistical Area with around 650,000 people...more people means more potential members. Despite these advantages, recruiting new members, and even more important: retaining them so they continue to be part of a strong club, is a never-ending effort. Based on our experiences in the last few years, I will try to share a few approaches that have served our club well.

Have a strong regular program of activities: People look to join a club for the benefits. In the case of a club like ours, they are hoping to learn more about the hobby and have the opportunity to go on collecting trips, etc. We have a very active field trip program during the months that permit it, and open these trips to guests in order to attract new members. Our club owns a nice collection of lapidary equipment, and access to that equipment is another great benefit (to be fair, like other clubs, workshop space and access have been challenging at times, though we hope a new home we have found for our workshop will provide even more incentive to be in the club). We also have monthly meetings like most clubs. It is these meetings that I think have the biggest impact on decisions whether to be in the club. Let's face it, meetings can be boring. Because our club is a non-profit corporation, we have a certain amount of "business" that must be presented at the meetings. We also have door prizes, a program, and refreshments. These features have been part of the meetings as long as I have been in the club. What we have changed, if anything, is that the program and other parts of the meetings are now much more focused on members sharing their knowledge about the hobby, and less about the business stuff. What we have found is that new members in particular wanted more sharing and learning time.

Be family friendly: A strong and long-lived club requires a broad, healthy age distribution. Older members (who are often, but not always, longtime contributors to the hobby) are an essential resource for a club: they bring wisdom, the ability to volunteer when others have to work, and charm (among other things). Kids (and their parents who tend to fill in the age gap) are the future of the club. Our club has worked very hard to attract families with kids and provide exciting activities for the kids. ALL club functions are family friendly and kids are welcome to join field trips, use our workshop, and join our meetings. At meetings, we have a special concurrent program where the kids learn about Earth science and come away with treasures donated by club members. I don't have hard data, but I suspect a significant portion of our members retained past the first year have children that benefit from our programs.

Be visible: For people to join the club, they need to know about it. Our club maintains a nice website, and that certainly helps (that is how I learned about the club). Nothing beats face to face exposure, though. Our club hosts an annual Gem Show, and we have certainly stepped up efforts to recruit new members from the nearly 3000 adult + 1000 youth attendees we see every year (they are a good captive audience that is already interested in the hobby at some level). We have also spent a lot of time reaching out to interest groups that dovetail with our hobby. Examples include a local gold prospecting club, local science teachers, and the metaphysical community. It is also important to follow up when they contact you as well. For instance, a local group that decorates gourds (often with lapidary materials) contacted us about exhibiting at their show; we did, and made a lot of great contacts and some new members. There is one other avenue for recruiting that has been especially valuable for us: our local rock shop. People new to the hobby often visit a rock shop to get started and ask questions. We are fortunate that our local shop, Stewart's Gem Shop, is owned by a family of long-time members and club founders. They have a stack of applications, and take the time to sell their clientele on joining the club. They recruit a lot of members for us. Similar relationships with other points of entry to the hobby (museums, teachers, bead stores, etc.) would be equally effective if there is personal contact and recruitment.

So what is the secret to our success? It is probably all of the above. Of the things I mentioned above, probably the two most important are 1) making sure that club activities meet the needs and desires of current and potential members (especially those with kids), and finding ways to increase your face to face recruitment activities. I hope that the rest of the clubs in the Federation can find similar success...each other's strength makes all of us stronger.

IDENTIFYING UNMARKED SOLDERS

There are plenty of ways to mark your sheet or wire solders, but suppose you forgot to mark them and have a couple that you can't identify. The answer is to compare the melting temperature of the unknowns with that of a known solder. What I do is take a thick scrap of copper or nickel and arrange several solders on it. Ideally, I would have a sample of easy, medium and hard known solders surrounding the unknown solder. Then I heat the plate from the bottom and watch the order in which the solders melt.



INEXPENSIVE ELECTRIC WAX PEN

You can make your own wax pen from a small soldering iron plugged into a light dimmer switch for heat control. Both components are easily found at Radio Shack, a big hardware store or at Harbor Freight. As an example of the components, see www.harborfreight.com items #43060 and #47887

File the tip of the soldering iron into the shape you prefer or even better get a soldering iron with replaceable tips. Then you can make several tip shapes for different tasks. Set the dimmer control just hot enough to melt the wax without producing any smoke.

A tip design that I find ideal for some work is a length of small gauge wire that lets me reach in around the model to melt some wax. The wire is about 15mm long and 18 or 20 gauge. To conduct heat all the way to the tip, I use Sterling wire and silver solder it into a hole on the end of a copper or brass rod that will fit into the soldering iron.

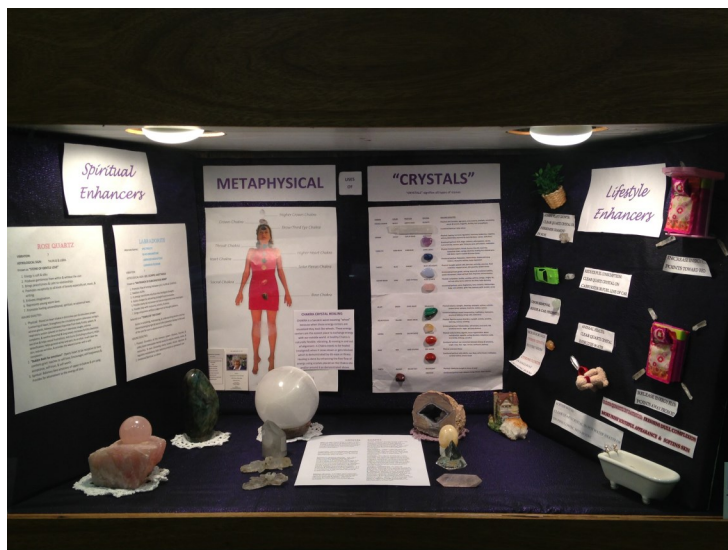

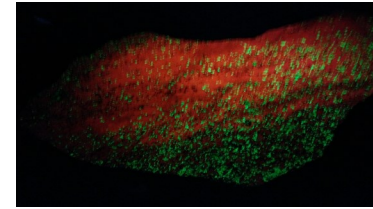

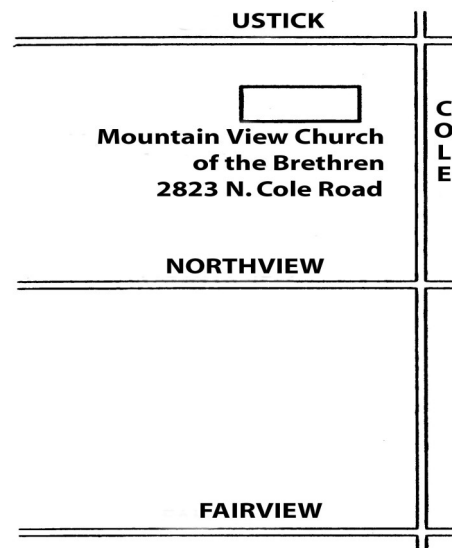
