NFMS 2017 Annual Meeting Report By Linda Barlow Federation Director Idaho Gem Club

Below is the report of all the meetings I attended using the NFMS Annual Meeting Agenda. Also pictures of the wonderful Gem Show that Bitterroot Gem & Mineral Society put on. They started with a potluck supper for all the vendors and participants at the show. There were about 30 display cases (see pictures) including 2 Past President cases, 2 Montana rock cases, and a black light case. The children's activities included garnet dig, and plinko spin (like wheel of fortune). There was a flinting demonstration continually. There were 2 dinosaur skeleton displays (see pictures). The speakers discussed Glacial Lake Missoula, Gold and silver in Flint Creek Valley, Crystal Park and other Montana Digs, Sapphires, Two Medicine Center, the Woolly Mammoth, and the Gold Mines of Alaska. The meetings I attended included NFMS Endowment Fund and delegates meeting, NFMS Annual Meeting (3 hours), Awards Banquet, Editors Breakfast, S.C.R.I.B.E. meeting, & the Junior Advisor's Meeting.

President's Report by Jim Bosley: He had directed all the societies of NFMS to monitor the Federal Agencies to insure we are included in the decisions made doing this by developing working relationships with the Federal Agencies and local public leaders in our state. He has encouraged our club to join ALAA and keep them informed of issues in the Northwest. He has noted the decrease in NFMS membership and encourages us to make our society relevant to families and younger people using the communication media we favor.

Secretary's Report by Judi Allison: This included a Federation Director responsibilities list under the operations manual. She suggested that our **club members avail themselves of the Membership Directory contents** including NFMS Articles of Incorporation, By-Laws, Operating Procedures & a complete list of the NFMS Program Library holdings (which is available to any club for programs). Treasurer's Report by Lyle Vogelpohl: He presented the 2016/2017 General Fund Cash Receipts and Disbursements, NFMS Membership Report 2016-2917.

1st VP Keith Fackrell presented the NFMS Budget Forecast for 2017 (Sept, 2017-August 31, 2018).

Jim Landon presented the Bulletin Editors contest for 2017 at the Editor's Breakfast on 5/22/17. Where it was discussed the difficulty for applicants to the contestant guidelines. Because very few people know how to maneuver through the AFMS online application (used by NFMS) our NFMS Newletter editor, Beth Heesacker, will be a resource for those of us wanting to do applications for this contest next year. **This deadline is March 30th, 2018**.

The NFMS inventory list was presented by Ronna Watkins, 2nd VP.

Any Directory changes need to be submitted to Carol Willey. I have already submitted the necessary changes needed for my address correction. If there are others who find needed corrections, please contact me so I can coordinate with Idaho Gem Club Treasurer (who is our Membership chairperson also).

Endowment Fund Meeting and Report was presented by Jim Brain, our new Financial Advisor (It was open to all Federation Directors and delegates): At the meeting, **operation changes** on page 27 of the Operations Procedures under Fund Management were (1) Item 2: "Unrestricted Funds" with deletion of "in the immediate past fiscal year" and (2) in the first paragraph under the definitions (restricted, unrestricted, temporarily restricted funds) the deletion of the words "and may become restricted funds" thus allowing reinvestment of all funds not used

during the fiscal year following their generation shall be used as unrestricted funds.

During the General Annual Meeting, the proposal passed for one use of the Endowment Fund in the coming year will be to pay \$1 of each member's NFMS membership fee (\$3.50) thereby reducing the total fee paid by each club for the NFMS annual dues to \$2.50 for each member. This is in keeping with the purpose of the Endowment Fund "for the general benefit of the NFMS membership" and not to give the funds outside NFMS (as discussed at the 2016 annual meeting). This will take approximately \$5600 from the fund.

Also during the annual meeting, Jim Brain, presented the Financial Advisor's Report using Charles Schwab Investment company this year.

The NFMS annual field trip will be at Blue Forest, Montana at 7,000 feet on May 28 & 29, 2017 as reported by Doug True.

Historian, Linda Barlow from Idaho Gem Club, reported receiving the Historian Files and now stored at her home. She requested for any one with NFMS Annual Meeting 2016 memorabilia to please contact her. Also she is compiling a list of all the applicable Museums in each clubs region and asked for each club to submit a list to her. She also noted the plans for digitalizing the Files.

Junior Achievement Awards were reported by Audrey Vogelpohl. During the Junior Advisor Meeting on Sunday, May 22, 2017, Audrey discussed the Junior Achievement Program with suggestions for local clubs on meeting times and coordination with adult programs for continuation of knowledge. The online manual for the Badges/patches is 210 pages! Suggestions were presented of what various clubs are doing with their youth and their success. It was presentations of thinking outside the box! A Junior Program can also help our new adult members as it is geared to basics including the parents of the juniors as they listen and participate during the Junior program (this is not a babysitting). Several clubs discussed how they work with local schools and homeschooling students including having "Learning Days" and summer activities. The suggestion was to promote the club as "family club" knowing that these youth with comeback as adults with the knowledge and love of the hobby they learn during their school years. Other items presented were lab book folder, egg crate mineral/rock collection, use of pictures, junior case filled by juniors for display at show, and juniors learning from judges' positive input on the display for future improvement and praise for current display well done! (see attached pictures)

Our NFMS Newsletter editor, Beth Heesacker, reminded everyone that the newsletter is mailed to all members but also available online electronically.

Nominating Committee presented out 2017-18 Board Members: President, Keith Fackrell; 1st VP, Ronna Watkins; 2nd VP, Kenneth Zhan; Secretary, Judi Allison; Treasurer, Lyle Vogelpohl (see attached pictures).

This Board was installed at the Banquet (see attached pictures) Saturday night, May 22, 2017, at the Bitterroot Inn in Hamilton, Montana. They will take office September 1, 2017. The Whangdoodle was presented to Jim Bosley as outgoing president.

The Northwest Rockhound Retreat starts Labor Day 2017 for the whole week of classes with only 3 openings remaining as of the meeting! The NFMS is looking for a 2019 show bid with the 2018 meeting/show at Yakima.

Public Land Advisory position is open.

Rockhound of the year awards were presented at the Banquet.

The NFMS has awarded 2 worthy graduate students' scholarships of \$4000 each through the AFMS Scholarship Foundation.

Show Coordination: Discussion was presented and agreed upon that the NFMS would create a Show Manual this year for the Host Club with all pertinent information. Doug True said he has a previous Show Manual and will be forwarding to the NFMS Historian and Judi Allison, Secretary.

Darrell Watkins, NFMS Librarian, has compiled a list of Videos/slides/powerpoints for the NFMS clubs to use found in the NFMS Directory. The order form is also in the Directory with online availability.

The NFMS Stamp Program has been very successful. So far this year, \$480 has been received for the stamps. The Owyhee Gem & Mineral Society and the Idaho Gem Club, both of Idaho, each brought in 3 boxes of stamps

to the annual meeting and were so recognized. Proposed and passed is an added use for the Stamp money this year: the deemed worthy cause of purchasing supplies (special type of yarn & fiberfill) for breast pads for mastectomy patients (given free of charge). See: knittedknockers.org

Our Webmaster, Brad Larson, reported that our website was successfully moved and now is in our hands to control with success of usage: 72% new people and 28% old members used the site so far this year. Suggestions for website competition were encouraged for next year with only 2 submissions this year.

ALAA report by Laureen William, ALAA VP, noted the website, "amlands.org" for members and nonmembers to keep abreast of our rockhound hunting sites and what is happening. Also encouraged us to get on BLM notification list.





DRILL PRESS VISE

A drill press vise is a versatile tool to hold a workpiece securely and in precise alignment. It reduces the chance of risks of working with high power motors, use of larger drill bits, and higher heat generated in the operation. The vise can be clamped to the drill press table if needed and is quite handy for use at the bench to hold things for sawing or riveting.

You can find them at stores that carry machine tool supplies. My feeling is that the best ones are made from steel. In particular, I like the ones with V grooves cut into the jaw plates. That lets me hold a punch straight upright or hold a rod horizontal. To find a supplier,



search on "drill press vise" at sites like <u>micromark.com</u> <u>mscdirect.com/enco</u> <u>smallparts.com</u> <u>griz-zly.com</u> <u>sears.com</u>

DENTAL GOLD

You might think that a couple pieces of dental gold would be valuable, but if you only have a small amount, it can be a problem. Sending it to a refiner is expensive for small amounts of metal.

I made the mistake of thinking I could melt it and roll out my own sheet. However, the trace metals that dental gold contains to make it a good material in your mouth cause it to crack if you try to forge it or roll it out as a sheet. It ruined my whole ingot.

So what to do with a couple gold crowns? A reasonable alternative is to try incorporating the metal into your jewelry. If you have enough material to do a casting, that's probably the best use for dental gold. If you're not into casting, try melting it on a solder pad and while molten, divide it into small pieces with your solder pick. Then re-flow each piece to make little gold balls for use as accents on your designs. The balls can also be planished a bit to make small discs or struck with a design stamp to add texture.


