There were no corrections to the meeting minutes, Willa made a motion to accept the minutes as printed in the Grindings, Deana seconded, motion passed.

**Treasurer Report**: Rochelle Eytchison made the correction to last month's statement and reviewed the transactions for this month. Many show dealers have sent in their fees. She also had questions about the treasurer position that were answered.

**Program Report**: The program for this month's meeting was discussed as a Trick or Treat Trivia Contest. Discussion followed regarding the monthly meeting and where to put the program to better promote participation without disrupting the flow of the meeting. Some suggestions included conducting the business meeting last, more development of the Juniors program, and purchasing a better microphone/speaker set. 
#### WORKSHOP SCHEDULE By Brent Stewart

#### **REMEMBERING WITH LOVE**


In Memory of Helen C. Dillion.






#### **2019 Convention Show:**

**OPAL CRACKS & CRAZING BY Paul Downing** Opal, they say, is a delicate stone. There are two things that may happen to an opal. It may crack or it may craze. An opal may crack when subjected to severe pressure applied by a sharp instrument, but so can diamonds, & many diamonds do chip. An opal may craze if it dries out &/or changes its internal structure. But the vast majority of opals do not crack or craze. Crazing is readily identifiable in an opal. It starts with small intertwined cracks at the surface of the stone which may spread over time. The pattern they form looks like a spider web or a dried mud puddle. Scientists do not know why some opals craze. One common explanation is that the opal loses part of the water trapped between silica spheres. It then shrinks, & the surface tension causes the crazing another explanation is that the chemical structure of the silica spheres changes as a result of being exposed to the light. The energy of the light activates the chemical reaction. Cracking is easily distinguished from crazing. Cracks are long & go into the stone. When examined with transmitted light, a crack will reflect an orange light from one or more directions. Usually there is only one crack. Cracks are caused by external pressure. The miners break up large pieces of opal by squeezing them between the sharp jaws of a file nipper. Prongs in jewelry designed for faceted stones do the same thing to an opal. Most cracked opals are the result of inappropriate setting. On rare occasions, an opal will crack for no apparent reason. People have told me of opals that cracked in their rings when they went outside in very cold weather.

The problem of cracking & crazing made me curious, so I started an experiment about a year ago. I took several opals & put them in a paper bowl in the freezer. After several days they were frozen solid. I then ran them under scalding tap water. After repeating this exercise 6 times, none of the opals cracked or crazed. Next I placed these opals inn a west window & let them bake in the hot Florida sun. after almost a year, not a one has cracked or crazed. The experiment included opals of several types. Base colors ranged from white to gray. Some opals had full fire, some only lines of color, & some no fire at all. They were from Cober Pady, Mintabia, Andamooks, & Lightning Ridge. Some had inclusions in them. Others did cracks. Neither the inclusions nor the cracks spread. I conclude from my observations that we really do not know why an opal crazes. We do know that almost all (well over 99%) of the opal from any Australian mining area does not craze. We know that almost all cracking results from pressure caused by improper setting of the opal or extraordinarily rough wear. Opal has an undeserved reputation. Cracking & crazing are very rare. Is opal delicate? Not really.

#### LAYOUT TOOLS

Dimensions on some features of a design can be fluid while others must be accurate for the design to work. When precision on a piece is important, good layout techniques are essential.

These are the tools that I rely upon to get holes in the right place, to achieve correct angles, and to cut pieces the correct length.

I like crisp sharp lines to follow, so I often coat surfaces with a dark marker and scribe my layout lines onto the metal. A square makes quick work of checking right angles or marking where to cut, and the thin center punch helps me mark a place to drill holes exactly where I want them.


Finally, a good set of dividers is probably my favorite layout tool. They let me quickly mark a strip for cutting, swing an arc, and divide a line or curve into as many equal segments as I need. I keep at least one set of dividers in every toolbox.

#### INVENTORY RECORD

In an ideal world each of us has a complete pictorial record of all pieces of jewelry in our inventory. We use the pics for marketing, and we use the record for insurance. We use it to remember which items have been sent out on consignment, or we use it to mark which items we're taking to a show. And eventually, we note in the record the pieces that have sold.

Unfortunately, we don't always have time to take good pictures of each piece for a detailed inventory. In situations like this I've been able to make a quick group shot with the help of a smart phone, a camera, a scanner, or a color copier. The quality is more than sufficient to accurately identify the pieces.


Jim Brace, AFMS Junior Chair discussed the Competition winners and their displays at the AFMS Convention in Ventura, California, this year.
