Treasurers Report: by Rochelle Eytchison -Questions concerning the printing costs for the Mini-Miners Monthly newsletter for Junior Rattlers. Will get Linda to clarify at next meeting.

-Rochelle addressed Sandy's question about the Building Fund money in the money market account. She gave a detailed explanation of the funds and will list scholarship, building fund, etc. separately in the future.

-Revenue from the club auctions was verified by Cheryl Link to be for the Banquet costs.

Federation Director Report: No report d/t Linda Barlow on vacation.

Field Trip Report: by Cheryl Link

-The Field Trip to the Oregon Sunstone claim had some very good material collected. There was a snake on the claim, so part of the time was spent at the public claim area.

-The August field trip will be to Reynolds Creek for petrified wood. You will need to break it out of hard matrix material. Sandy warned about the fenced area to avoid so the local farmer doesn't get upset. The meeting point will be at the parking lot across from Walter's Ferry. The meeting time is 7:30 am, leaving at 8:00 am. It takes about an hour to get to Walter's Ferry and about 45 minutes to get to Reynolds Creek. The road is paved most of the way. Rock hammer and shovel will be needed. Everyone was reminded of the 25 lb. limit for petrified wood. Yearly limit is 250 lbs. **Workshop Report**: by Brent Stewart

-He reported that things went very well for the last Kids Day. -He also had a field trip at the workshop for Tumble Time kids. -There was much discussion on the limit of cabs that can be done in the workshop by club members. The workshop is not to be used for commercial purposes, but limits need to be discussed. No final decision was made yet. If no decision is made at the August meeting we may call a special meeting for workshop issues.

-Brent reminded everyone that specimens can't be worked on the cab machines. He has offered to provide a machine with a 12" x 4" expandable drum to work on specimens. The machine will sand and polish. The sandpaper for it will be provided at \$4 per sheet.

Old Business:

-Sandy Blodgett asked for clarification on the bonds for the claims. The Sunstone claim has a bond with the BLM for \$1,500. It covers all three claims at the Sunstone area. The bond price depends on the amount of surface work/exposure. If you increase the area worked the bond would increase.

-Howard Roose researched the bond and claim requirements for the Queenstone claim. The 2007 bond on the Queenstone claim was released. To do improvements on the claim it would need to be reinstated. Under five acres would require a notice of intent for surface disturbance, versus using a plan of operations which would take approximately three years to process.

-Cheryl Link described her efforts for the Sunstone claim as meeting with the BLM and walking the site markers, as well as pictures of before and after work on the claim. They also give information on how to operate any pit and maintain the road. BLM approval is required before any equipment is used. The club currently has 9 claims.

-Dana Robinson had questions on accepting equipment that needs to be repaired and what we would do with it. The issue will need to be continued to next month.

New Business: Willa presented the proposed budget for this year. We had a lively discussion on the numbers. There was nothing unusual, though. Ed Moser made a motion to accept the budget, Cheryl Peterson seconded. The motion carried with one abstention.

-It was suggested that we look into purchasing a used printer to save on costs of printing the Grindings and all of the other treasurer reports, etc. Also to be continued. -Fourteen new members applications were reviewed. 


National Forests, Motorized Vehicle Ban

A district court granted in part and denied in part outdoor groups' motion for summary judgment seeking injunctive relief from the U.S. Forest Service's Travel Plan for the Bitterroot National Forest (Travel Plan), which prohibits motorized and bicycle travel in wilderness study areas (WSA) within the forest. Snowmobile, off-road vehicle, and mountain bike groups argued that the Forest Service violated the National Forest Management Act, the Montana Wilderness Study Act, NEPA, and the APA when it adopted the Travel Plan. The court largely disagreed, finding that the groups failed to show that the Forest Service's actions to ban motorized vehicles from WSA trails were arbitrary, capricious, an abuse of discretion. or otherwise not in accordance with the law. The court did, however, find that the Forest Service abused its discretion when it failed to provide an opportunity for public comment on the closure of 110 miles of WSA trails to bicyclists. The court therefore granted in part and denied in part the groups' motion for summary judgment, and remanded the matter of WSA closure to bicyclists to the Forest Service for further consideration. Land management agencies to implement Stage 1 Fire Restrictions in southwest Idaho:

BOISE, Idaho -- With the threat of wildfire danger increasing rapidly, state and federal land management agencies will implement Stage 1 Fire Restrictions on all lands within southwest Idaho effective Aug. 3, 2018, beginning at 12:01 a.m. Fire restrictions limit certain activities in the outdoors to decrease the chance of any preventable fires in the designated areas.

The Stage 1 Fire Restrictions will be in effect, until further notice, in the Treasure Valley, West Central Mountains, and Owyhee Mountains of Idaho which includes all federal, state and private forestland and rangeland in:

Ada, Canyon, Gem, Payette, Elmore, Boise, Valley, Washington counties and Owyhee County west of Bruneau Canyon. Within Washington County, all Bureau of Reclamation lands surrounding Mann Creek Reservoir. Within Valley County, all Bureau of Reclamation lands surrounding Lake Cascade. Within Elmore and Boise counties, all Bureau of Reclamation lands surrounding Arrowrock and Anderson Ranch reservoirs.

These restrictions are being implemented by agencies managing or providing wildland fire protection, including the U.S Forest Service (USFS), Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the Idaho Department of Lands (IDL). Fire managers divide Idaho into zones and the fire restrictions will affect the following zones:

Treasure Valley Fire Restrictions Zone:

All of Ada, Canyon, Gem, Payette and Washington counties. Portions of Boise County including the administrative boundary of Lucky Peak Lake to Arrowrock Dam, south shore of Arrowrock Reservoir and that portion of Elmore County that lies south of the South Fork Boise River to Anderson Ranch Dam, south along Anderson Dam Road (FS Rd 134) to Highway 20, east on Highway 20 to the Elmore/Gooding County line south to Interstate 84. The Treasure Valley Restriction area is bounded by the Idaho/Oregon boundary to Oreana then follows the Bachman Grade to Triangle and continues east-northeast of the Owyhee Front to the Bruneau River. The northern boundary begins near Weiser, Idaho and follows Highway 95 to Indian Valley, then generally follows the Little Weiser River to the

Payette and Boise National Forest boundary lines. West Central Mountains Fire Restrictions Zone: Boise National Forest, Boise District BLM and State and Endowment Lands within Elmore County, Boise County, and Valley County to include all Bureau of Reclamation lands surrounding Lake Cascade. From the point where the Boise National Forest boundary intersects State Highway 20 near Dixie following the Boise National Forest boundary west and north along the ridge of the Danskin to Boise Front foothills and extending north encompassing the Idaho Department of Lands to its intersection back with the Boise National Forest boundary near Sage Hen Reservoir. The far northern boundary includes all Boise National Forest lands, excluding the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness. All lands north of Sage Hen Reservoir including Tripod Mountain and West Mountain within the North Fork Payette River drainage north to near Tamarack Resort.

Owyhee Fire Restrictions Zone:

All of Owyhee County west of the Bruneau Canyon Under the Stage 1 Fire Restrictions, the following acts are prohibited on private, state and federally managed or protected lands, roads and trails:

-Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire or stove fire **except** within a designated recreation site within a permanent concrete or metal fire ring, or on their own land within an owner-provided structure.

-Smoking, except within an enclosed vehicle, building or designated recreation site, or while stopped in an area at least 3 feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all flammable materials.

The following are exemptions to the Stage 1 Fire Restrictions:

-Persons with a written permit that specifically authorizes the otherwise prohibited act.

-Persons using fire fueled solely by liquid petroleum or liquid petroleum gas (LPG) fuels. Such devices, including propane campfires, may be used only in an area cleared of flammable material.

-Persons conducting activities in those designated areas where the activity is specifically authorized by written posted notice.

Any federal, state or local officer or member of an organized rescue or firefighting force in the performance of an official duty. All land within a city boundary is exempted. Other exemptions unique to each agency. Fire managers are asking the public to be extra cautious when spending time in the outdoors. As a reminder, fireworks are prohibited on state and private forestland and rangeland during closed fire season (May 10 through Oct. 20), and on public lands, roads and trail in Idaho all times of the year.



AUGUST - PERIDOT

Peridot is the gem quality variety of forsteritic olivine. The chemical composition of Peridot is an iron magnesium silicate (Mg, Fe)2SiO4, with Mg in greater quantities than Fe. Peridot is one of the few gemstones that comes in only one color, a rich, green color with a slight tinge of gold caused by very fine traces of iron. The depth of green depends on how much iron is contained in the crystal structure, and varies from yellow-green to olive to brownish green. Olivine is a very abundant mineral in mafic and ultramafic rocks, but gem quality Peridot occurs only rarely. Peridot crystals have been collected from some Pallasite meteorites.

Peridot is not particularly hard, only 6.5 to 7 on the Mohs scale, but it is easy to look after and fairly robust. after they are cut. The cutters know full well that this gemstone is anything but easy to work with as there is often a good deal of tension on the inside of the crystal. The Peridot is cut in accordance with its crystal shape, mostly faceted or in classical table cuts, or round, antique, as an octahedron or oval. Smaller crystals are cut into standardized series stones, larger ones into imaginative one-offs. Cabochons are made if the material contains more inclusions, for the domed cut brings out the fine silky shine of the inclusions to their best. Peridot cat's eyes and star peridot are particularly rare and precious.

Peridot olivine is mined in Australia, Brazil, China, Kenya, Myanmar,

Norway, Pakistan, South Africa, Sri Lanka and Tanzania. In the United States it is mined in North Carolina. Arizona, Hawaii, Nevada and New Mexico.

SAWING SMALL TUBING

When making a hinged bracelet, I needed to cut 16 pieces of small diameter silver tubing. These were to be just approximate lengths and trimmed to final size after soldering. Not having a tube cutter, I had trouble holding the tubing on the bench pin while trying to saw through it. SAWING SMALL TUBING

So here's what I did. I drilled a hole in the side of the bench pin just large enough for the tubing to slide into and almost as deep as the length of cut tubing I wanted. Sawing became quick and easy. With my free hand, I inserted the tubing and held it from rotating while sawing off each length.

SECRET INGREDIENT

Those of us who use paste solders sometimes find an old tube has dried out. There should be some way to recondition it, but what to use? Calling tech support at the suppliers didn't work for me. Either they don't know what the ingredient is or won't tell you the secret.

None of us likes to waste an expensive material, especially at \$16 - 20 a tube, so I've often experimented with ways to rejuvenate it. Mixing in a liquid flux doesn't work. When the liquid starts to boil off, it spatters the solder in all directions.

But after several failed experiments I finally found a way that does work. My secret ingredient is Vaseline petroleum jelly. Mix in just enough to restore the consistency to something that's usable. If you use too much, the lump of solder will flow over a wide area as soon as the torch starts heating it.

If your solder is in a syringe, it can be a little difficult to get the plunger out. I find the easiest way is to poke a hole through the solder from the tip to the rubber plunger (a bur shaft was the right size for my tube). The hole allows air to enter between the solder and the plunger, allowing the plunger to be slowly withdrawn. Once the solder is out of tube, you can easily add the Vaseline, mix it up, and spoon it back into the syringe.



FIRE UPDATE – Strong winds and high temperatures will affect the fire area today. North winds caused the fire to move further up the Middle Fork of the Weiser River, Fall Creek, and the North Fork of Grays to the east and southeast.

Additional growth occurred on the southern flank, south of Grays Creek Road. On the northern flank, the fire continued to progress up the Cottonwood drainage to the north.

There was little growth on the western flank of the fire where fuels are lighter and fire lines held. Firefighters assisted by aerial resources and engines will continue to build fire line. When needed, they will use burn out operations when it will assist in stopping or containing the fire.

Various pieces of firefighting equipment will be staged at the ITD yard south of COuncil. As needed on the fire, equipment will be ready and prepared to deploy from that area.

Structure Protection will continue by the Council Fire District and Indian Valley Rural Department.

Fuel moistures are very low and the fire has been pushed by winds and steep terrain. The weather continues to be very hot and dry and will remain a challenge for firefighting efforts.

EVACUATIONS – There are no mandatory evacuations at this time. North Grays Creek remains at a Level 2, pre-evacuation status.

CLOSURES – There is a Forest Closure Order in effect (#0412-522) for areas within and surrounding the Mesa Fire.

Kamiah, Idaho (July 13, 2018) – The Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forests will be hosting several opportunities later this summer for the public to discuss Forest Plan Revision with members of the Forest Plan Revision Team and Forest Leadership. These open house meetings, called "Coffee with the Planners," will be informal and provide an opportunity to ask questions and learn about the Forest Plan Revision process and the alternatives to be analyzed in the Draft Environmental Impact Statement.

All open houses will take place from 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. (PDT). At the meetings, Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forests leadership and staff will discuss the current status of Forest Plan Revision, answer questions, and listen to the public in an informal, conversational setting.

The Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forests initiated Forest Plan Revision in early 2012. After 20 months of collaboration with the public, Nez Perce Tribe, partner agencies, and the Clearwater Basin Collaborative, the forest released an assessment in June 2014 and Notice of Intent with the draft proposed action in July 2014. Over the past two years, Forest Plan Revision Team members have had over 70 meetings with governments, government agencies, individuals, and non-government organizations. In early 2018, the forest met with hundreds of individuals at public meetings focused on Alternative Development and conducted a webinar to reach a broader audience. At this time, the Nez Perce-Clearwater National Forests is preparing a Draft Environmental Impact Statement which is scheduled to be released in spring 2019.
