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

The field trips of the Idaho Gem Club in Boise have wetted my appetite but never on the overnight or high clearance vehicle trips (I didn't have the camping equipment or the vehicle). This year started by going with a friend who owns a Suburban, high clearance vehicle, to Succor Creek and finding Thundereggs, Geodes, and 2 limb casts as big as my forearms!



Then took a trip to Spencer Mines in western Idaho in the Suburban. No accommodation close by so went to Lima, Montana, 30 miles up the freeway and stayed at a very nice motel and RV place. The rooms at the motel were efficiencies! Wow best price deal ever and reasonably good food at the restaurant across the street. Could have stayed another day and hunted fossils! What did I find at Spencer? A Fire Opal first thing then lots of other opals including blue.







of the dirt, and (4) holding the screen up to the sunlight to see any missed Sunstones!!! It took all day! Eight hours in the sun without a hat but did wear a long-sleeved white shirt. It took me 2 days to wash out the iron color from the dirt! I got lots of sun and Sunstones! The last day, we spent the morning at the Idaho Gem Club's Sunstone claim. My friend dug and I walked the perimeter. We found about the same! Hungry and hot at lunch time we returned to the RV for food and rest. I walked at the public collection site, but the heat drove me back inside. We then went through the conveyor belt at Spectrum for one hour looking for Sunstones – that was more rewarding and very competitive! We switched lead position every 15 minutes so we both had equal time getting the first Sunstones which came out onto the conveyor. (It reminded me of that candy conveyor belt Lucille Ball worked on with her friend Vivian?!! I wasn't popping candy but my fingers were popping to catch the stones first or find any that my friend missed!) The road in and out of Sunstone Collection Area was long (20 miles on Hogback Road & 14 miles at turn off to collections site very well labeled), all dirt, and very dusty. We taped over all our RV vents but to no avail. What a thorough cleaning of everything before and after, including my nose!



Home from Sunstone for 2 days and then left for Emerald Creek, Idaho! Beautiful country Idaho! We hunted garnets. At Emerald Creek, the process is (1) to fill our own buckets from a communal sand pile, (2) carry them to the sifting area, (3) find a 24" x 24" or 12" x 12" screen, (4) sift the dirt and mud (that required scraping with a larger stone), (5) putting the stones into a separate bucket, (6) carrying the bucket to the water trough, (7) waiting for a space (it was opening weekend, so everyone was there!), then (8) look for garnets to shine in the sun. That was fun but who said rockhunting isn't work! My hands were dry and parched – sure used a lot of lotion!

On to Crystal Park, Montana, near Dillon. I had been there a couple of years ago right after a rainstorm. That is the best time to go as all the stones are on the surface and no digging to find the big ones! It rained the day before we arrived and the night we got there is was snowing!!! I wasn't prepared for snow so piled all my clothes on and slowly pealed them off as it got warmer on July 4th. The mosquitoes and No-see-ums found me! What a great way to celebrate our country's independence! I found multiple clear quartz crystals and one small amethyst. My friend did have the find of the day: a 293 carat amethyst phantom recorder!!! Wow, I was so happy for him!



We left Crystal Park, Montana, and traveled north looking at the Rocky Mountains! Then south to Phillipsburg, Montana, to Gem Mountain. Stayed right on the grounds in the RV! They have a deal, buy 6 buckets of dirt and receive one bucket free. We both chose to do that. We each did 3 buckets the day we arrived and 4 the next day!

That is a lot of filling screens about 12" x 12", washing, and flipping onto a black surface to look for sapphires. I found a full tube of Sapphires both days! According to the stone evaluator, Jody, that is a lot to find in only 7 buckets. There were multiple colors of pink, purple, yellow, clear, blue, and green! I chose to have the 7 flawless sapphires heat treated and faceted. The others I will keep raw for healing to

use on grids, in meditation, and place around my apartment for their energy! Besides being a "stone of prosperity" Sapphires are also "record keepers". The colored ones have their additional qualities for emotional and spiritual and physical assistance of one's health.


That was the beginning of my summer!



The U.S. Senate will vote on the "Farm Bill" this week, which is legislation that addresses the needs of America's farmers and ranchers. I introduced three amendments to the bill, including one that would allow Idaho and other states to have a greater voice in the monument designation process. Knowing of your interest in this topic, I want to share more about my legislation with you todav.

Current federal law allows the President to designate large tracts of land as National Monuments, resulting in severe use restrictions without any public process or local input. During President Obama's Administration, he designated 26 separate monuments for a total of over 550 million acres – equal to 865,625 square miles, an area five times the size of California – without any state review or approval.


The monument designation process is in sore need of greater transparency, which is why I introduced an amendment to the 2018 Farm Bill that would require any new designation to be approved by Congress and the State Legislature where the monument will be located and must comply with the National Environmental Policy Act.

As a strong supporter of states' rights, I have cosponsored similar legislation in the Senate: S. 132, the National Monument Designation Transparency and Accountability Act, and S. 33. the Improved National Monument Designation Process Act, which prevents unilateral Executive decisions on national monuments. My amendment will be considered among hundreds of others this week as the Senate moves to vote on the Farm Bill. I encourage you





Silver products like sheet, wire, and casting shot are sold by the Troy ounce at what is called the spot price. That's what companies pay for the pure metal on the commodities market, and the spot price changes daily.

But in addition to the spot price, there is also a cost to fabricate the metal into wire or sheet, so the price of the item you buy is the cost of the metal plus the cost to make it. Different products have different fabrication charges because each takes a different amount of labor. Also, different companies will have different fabrication charges because of local labor rates and their desired profit margin.



You can save money by finding a company with a lower fabrication charge. Also, note that the fabrication charge per ounce is less on larger orders, so you can save more by buying more. Find a friend to place a joint order and split the shipping charges.

But for casting purposes, there's an even better way to save. Buy your silver at a coin store. They sell bars and rounds in pure and Sterling for the spot price plus about a dollar per ounce.

The local coin shop adds only a small profit over the spot price. So I save about \$3 per ounce, pay no shipping charges, don't have to wait for mail order, and support a local business.

SAWING JUMP RINGS

The difficult part of making jump rings for me has always been holding the coil while cutting off the individual rings. I use a saw to get the best fit when closing the rings later. I've seen all sorts of suggestions for ways to hold the coil, but the one that works best for me is this little jig made from scrap wood.

It's about 2 inches wide and 4-5 inches long with a groove cut down its length to cradle the coil of wire and a thin stop attached to the front end.

To cut the rings, thread your saw blade through the coil, hold the coil down in the groove and against the front stop, and saw through the bottom of the coil at about a 40 degree angle.

Don't forget to use some wax or cutting lube. It really does make a difference. If you don't believe me, do an experiment while you're cutting a lot of rings. Count how many rings can be cut before the blade breaks. First, do the test without lube, and then do it again while adding some lube to the blade after cutting every 8-10 rings.





It's the best way I've ever found to hold the coils easily and securely. If the coil doesn't move, you break fewer blades. And it is safer than some other techniques because you are cutting away from the fingers.

Using GIS Or Mobile Mapping Apps by Ruth Hidalgo

There are numerous apps for mobile phones that will allow you track your routes and favorite collecting spots. You need not have a separate GPS unit to create maps anymore. These apps work even when you do not have cell service.

My app of choice is Avenza. I started using an iPhone app called Terra Nova well over 15 years ago, and it has evolved into Avenza. I have used the data stored in that app to make several National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) comments. Basically, this is how it works.

You download the app.

You select the maps you want to download. Some are free, some you have to purchase. There are now thousands of maps to choose from. You can even download a geological map that will show you where you are and what the geology is around you. I prefer the BLM maps and USGS Topo maps for trail tracking. You have to have internet service to download a map, but not to use the app once the map is downloaded.

When in the field, you open the app and you will be able to see where you are on the map.

You can then choose to record your track or trail as you drive or hike. Save the trail and the next time you go out in the field, just follow the trail on your map and you will know how to get back to that collecting spot. Gone are the days of trying to remember what fork you took or wondering if you're on the right path. You can then export that information to Google Earth or other GIS programs. You can even email it to your friends.

You can also choose to place markers on the map showing collecting areas and use that data the same way.

You can insert a GPS coordinate a friend gave you and see where it is on the map relative to where you are.

You can use the data to easily create maps to attach to your formal NEPA comments. This gives the agency the exact trail you use and shows it to them on their own map. Alternatively, you can export the data to Google Earth or other GIS mapping programs and create maps to attach from there. I used a trail exported to Google Earth to create a map I attached to a formal comment on the West Mojave (WEMO) Travel Management Plan, where the Bureau of Land Management had not included a road that rockhounds use in their inventory. In this way they could see that the road clearly existed, as you could see it on the satellite image in the map I attached.

Nowadays, making formal comments is much easier, thanks to apps like Avenza. 
