Ed Moser made a motion to accept the meeting minutes as printed in the last Grindings. Cullen Anderson seconded and the motion passed.

Old Business

This will help with the amount of loading and unloading needed as they will be delivered.
- Willa also presented figures and a proposal to acquire trailers and outfit them for the cases and other equipment. The Board discussed the options, advantages and disadvantages of doing this. It was decided that the proposal will be printed in the Grindings and brought before the membership at the next general meeting.

New Business

- Several inquiries have been received by the club to participate in educational events at local libraries and summer programs. Deana will follow up with the schools and Brent will check with the summer program coordinator.
- Sandy expressed concern about the Treasurer and the amount of money she is in charge of at each show. Even though she had somebody to walk her to her car, he would like to have the Treasurer bonded, and at the same time become a Notary Public. Sandy explained what a bond is and how it works and Twila added more information. The board is in agreement with the need. Ed Moser made a motion that Sandy research the procedures and costs to do each and present it to the board at the next meeting. Deana seconded. The motion was passed.

Proposed Motion to Improve Annual Show Setup & Tear Down

I am proposing that we purchase trailers to hold our cases, tables and skirting for the Annual Gem and Mineral show. This upgrade will cut our setup and tear down in half as we will unload the trailers once and load them up once instead of twice. The loading and unloading process will be much easier as the trailers are a lot lower to the floor than the U-Haul trucks have been.

I have included a spec sheet on the trailers I'm proposing. They are 16 feet long 8 feet wide with +6 feet height. That means you can comfortably stand inside them for loading. There will be NO man door on our models and I am handling the installation of the case front racks which will be an additional cost. This is the exact same make and model that the Caldwell club is currently using and it has been proven to be very effective for the process we are needing.

The company I am proposing to use is located in Caldwell and the trailers are built in our State which means we will be promoting an Idaho product. I feel we should purchase new trailers for most of the material that is currently in our storage unit as it needs to be kept clean, safe and last for at least 30 years. For our rock material we can look for a used trailer as this material is not necessarily as clean and there will be a lot of wear and tear on this trailer.


My next proposal is to down size the amount of tables that we use or carry in our inventory. Since most of our current tables are in need of repair I feel it would be more cost effective to rent the dealer tables for our next show. As we complete the above process we will need to sort out the better table tops and refit the legs on the remaining tables that we will need for our demonstration, silent auction, grab bag, wheel of fortune, and black light areas.

It is my belief that the above proposals are necessary for our club to move forward and improve our Gem Show setup. They are cost effective and will give a more professional look to our show.








changed to the more highly prized blue shade by heating them in an electric furnace to 842°F. Aguamarine is closely related to the green emerald, the yellow heliodor, the rosepink morganite and the white goshenite, all beryl. Aguamarine occurs at most localities which yield ordinary beryl. Some of the finest comes from Russia, but the gem-gravel placer deposits of Sri Lanka also contain aquamarine. Clear yellow beryl, *heliodor*, occurs in Brazil where it is sometimes called aquamarine chrvsolite. Aguamarine is also found in Madagascar, Malawi, Tanzania, Kenya, Myanmar (formerly known as Burma) and parts of the United States (Mt. Antero in the Sawatch Range of Colorado). Aquamarine is the official state gem of Colorado, the birthstone for March (and sometimes September, October, and November) and is given for the 19th Anniversary. It is associated with the zodiac sign Scorpio, the planet Venus, the Fifth Chakra -Throat, and energies of protection, healing and magic. Folklore says the aquamarine will protect one against gossip.

BLOODSTONE

Bloodstone, called *Heliotrope* in Biblical times, is a variety of quartz, a warm green chalcedony or jasper, delicately flecked with vivid red spots. Although bloodstone seems a solid green material, it is actually filled with many minute green mossy 'growths', the mineral chlorite, with the small bright red spots, hematite, intermixed. Bloodstone has a hardness of 7 on the Mohs scale and depending on the color pattern and whether it is set

in gold or silver, may command prices much like turquoise.

Medieval folks believed that the Bloodstone received its coloring from Christ's own blood, falling upon a green jasper stone at the foot of the Cross. The early Christian Church named this St Stephen's Stone. These stones were greatly prized

by the Crusaders as a sort of talisman against the enemy. The early Egyptian and Babylonians used bloodstone to make durable seals and intaglios for wear. The stone was believed to control and stop bleeding, call thunder and lightening with heavy rain, give power over demons and evil spirits, and make the wearer invisible.

"No hope had they of crevice where to hide or heliotrope to charm them out of view", according to Dante, speaking of the dammed on the way to eternal darkness. In *The Decameron*, Boccaccio stated "The other stone is heliotrope, which renders those who have it invisible".

GEMS OF MARCH: AQUAMARINE & BLOODSTONE

Aquamarine is the gem quality transparent variety of the mineral beryl that is a blue, blue-green,

or green color. Its name comes from the Latin *aqua marina* or 'water of the sea', probably because its delicate blue or blue green color is suggestive of seawater. The blue variety is the most valuable. Greenish stones can sometimes be

MODIFYING PLIERS

Pliers-1: Sometimes a few changes to your tools can make work go faster and improve the quality at the same time. Stock tools need to be polished and can be customized using standard jewelry skills. Here's an example: While making a lot of chainmaile, I noticed I was ending up with a few scratched jump rings that required extra cleanup time before the chain could be polished. So I started looking into what I was doing wrong.

Making jump rings and weaving them into chainmaile designs involves a lot of opening and closing of the rings. I typically use two square jaw pliers to do this, one for each hand. The jaws of my pliers were pretty much scratch free because on a new tool I typically relieve any sharp edges, sand away any tool marks on working surfaces and give those areas a quick polish.

Pliers-2: That helped but was not the whole problem. While making chain, rings would sometimes slip out of the pliers or slide within the jaws as I was trying to twist them open or closed. I noticed the jaws close at an angle, and gave me the idea of forming a groove at the end of the jaw that would grasp the ring gently without scratching it. Not only have these pliers worked well for chainmaile, but I've found several other problem jobs that this modification solves very nicely.

Pliers-3: To make up what I needed, I bought two inexpensive sets of square jaw pliers. My preference is for jaws that are about 3.5 - 4mm wide. This provides a good fit for the jump rings I use, you need to have enough metal at the tip of the jaws to be able to cut a groove that's deep enough. If your plier tips are too thin, you'll have to cut them back. Locate and mark the position on the jaw where the thickness is about 1.6 - 2mm.

Pliers-4: Cut the tips off with a cutoff wheel or grind them off with a bench grinder. If using a cutoff wheel, be sure to brace and hold both the workpiece and the rotating handpiece securely. If either moves, you will break the abrasive disk. And remember when cutting any metal with a motorized tool, be sure to use good eye protection. A little piece of debris in your eye makes for a bad day. Pliers-5: Cut the tips off with a cutoff wheel or grind them off with a bench grinder. If using a cutoff wheel, be sure to brace and hold both the workpiece and the rotating handpiece securely. If either moves, you will break the abrasive disk. And remember when cutting any metal with a motorized tool, be sure to use good eye protection. A little piece of debris in your eye makes for a bad day. Pliers-6: Now to make the grooves round so they grasp the wire without distorting it, I close the jaws and run a drill through the opening formed by the two rough grooves. I start with a small drill and followed up with a drill just slightly smaller than the wire size I want to grip. In my case that was 14 gauge wire, so I chose a #53 drill.

Finally, the shape of the grooves needs to be refined. I used a coarse, knife edge, silicone polishing wheel on the flexshaft to polish off all marks left by the drill and to round off the outer edges of the groove.

Pliers-7: Test for proper fit by laying a jump ring into each groove. In particular, inspect the way the edges of the groove contact the inside of the ring. You may need to widen the groove at this point to avoid the pliers leaving a nick. Do a final polish so the jaws will not scratches as they grip a ring. I used a medium grit, knife edge, silicone polishing wheel but a sewn buff with tripoli or Zam would also work well.

MANAGING PRODUCTION

Many readers of these Bench Tips sell their jewelry at shows, in galleries or online. They are sole proprietors and constantly under pressure to design new pieces and make enough product to keep up with demand. So their options are few when a large order comes in. They can burn the midnight oil themselves, or they can be smart and get some temporary help. But you need good help, and you often need it fast. Jewelry assemblers are skilled, trustworthy and reliable craftsmen who make it their business to help others handle overloads and meet deadlines. Flexible arrangements are possible, working by the job, by the hour or by the piece. Each has a different mix of skills, from fabrication to enameling, casting, stone setting, lapidary and others. Assemblers are known to the trade, so you may have to ask around to find some references. But some assemblers advertise on the Net. For instance, a good friend of mine, Janice Metz LineT4@aol.com, has been working with designers and fabricators in the West Los Angeles area since 1997. She specializes in silversmithing, wire-wrapping, beading and stringing.
