

Having Fun By Jim Brace-Thompson, AFMS Juniors Program Chair

Join the Patricia Egolf Rock Pals Program to Have Fun Exchanging Rocks!

Before our Internet and Facebook era—way, way back when folks like I were mere youngsters-we had this thing called "mail" (minus the "e"). This thing involved pencils or pens and paper and stamps and envelopes that you licked. In that distant time, kids may have partnered with kids from schools in countries far-and-wide to become Pen Pals. Such letter-exchange programs enabled you to reach beyond your day-to-day experience to fly via letters to distant and exotic lands to broaden your horizons as you waited for weeks on end for a response to a letter you mailed in an honest-to-goodness mailbox. The cool stamps on the envelopes were as fun to receive and collect as the message inside! In 2011, Patricia Egolf of the Gem & Mineral Society of Syracuse, New York, suggested a new spin on this for junior rockhounds, namely, a "Rock Pals" program in conjunction with our AFMS Future Rockhounds of America program.

Kids love the different rocks and fossils to be found across our great nation, but they and their parents can't necessarily afford to buy them nor to travel widely to collect them. How wonderful it would be, Patricia thought, for juniors in a club to band together to collect local samples to trade with juniors in other clubs across the country. With that goal in mind, Pat helped us establish Rock Pals. A club gathers 20-25 or so local specimens in sizes small enough to fit in a medium-size flat-rate box available at the U.S. Post Office and, after making arrangements with another club, each mails a box to the other with samples and labels for what's inside. This, amazingly enough, is simply not to be accomplished via emails or text-messages!

Sadly, Pat passed away all-too-soon in 2012. To honor her memory and spirit, we re-named this effort the "Patricia Egolf Rock Pals Program." Participating clubs and contact persons are listed on the Kids Corner section of the AFMS website, <u>http://amfed.org/fra/rock_pals.htm</u>. To start a trade, email or call a local contact to make sure the club is still actively involved and to see how many kids are in that club and to make suitable arrangements for a rock swap.







IDAHO'S STATE ROCKHOUND SYMBOLS By

From Rock & Gem, November 2018

Idaho's nickname is "The Gem State" for its abundance of mineral wealth and scenic beauty, and in 1967 it designated a truly wonderful State Gem: the Idaho star garnet, a plum-purple variety of Almandine. Needlelike inclusions of rutile produce the optical star effect in stones that have been cut and polished as high-domed cabochons. Star garnets are rare – rarer even than star rubies or sapphires – and those from Idaho have been rated the world's best. Only in Idaho have elusive sixrayed star garnets been found. Formed in mica schists, these garnets erode out and end up concentrated in river gravel. The most famous locality is Emerald Creek in Benewah County.

Idaho is known as horse country and boasts wild herds. The earliest member of the modern genus *Equis* (horses, donkeys, and zebras) was *Equis simplicidens*. It is similar in structure and statue to African zebras. Dating from the early Pinocene Epoch (3.5 million hears old), it ranged from Idaho, through Nebraska, Texas, and as far southeast as Florida, but it was Idaho that put it on the map. Along the Snake River near the town of Hagerman, one of the world's best Pliocene fossil sites was excavated in the 1920s and 30's. Hundreds of fossil horses were shipped to the Smithsonian and museums around the world, and *Equis simplici*-

dens became popularly known as the Hagerman horse. It lived on grassy plains alongside mastodons and sabertooth cats. It's speculated an entire herd drowned while trying to cross a flooded river, resulting in the dense fossil deposit near Hagerman. When erosions and pilfering threatened the locality, Idaho citizens led a move to have the site preserved. In 1968, it became the Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument, and the Hagerman horse was declared the State Fossil.

SPECIAL GEM SHOW MEETING MINUTES October 30, 2018

Present: Dana Robinson, Deana Ashton, Willa Renken, Phil Neuhoff, Doug Renken, Cheryl Link, Linda Barlow, Cheryl Peterson

Meeting called to order at 7:30 p.m.

Dana Robinson gave a brief introduction of the meeting purpose of discussing the upcoming Gem Show. Doug Renken brought two copies of the show layout for reference. We discussed the placement of the Sand Dig at the back by the Garnet Table, instead of at the front with the Raffle Baskets. We also discussed providing space for a kid's activity table by the Black Light Room. Suggestions of possible volunteers to chair the table were made. They will be contacted to see if one or two are willing.

Willa Renken gave an update on the case trailer and showed pictures. She will be setting up a work party to fill it once hunting season is over and the menfolk are available to help. She is also getting prices and options together for new/ rented tables. Once we have options a decision can be made for updating the dealer tables. The good tables can be kept for the Silent Auction and Demonstrators areas. We also need to think about new case bases as our sawhorses are getting a little rickety.

Phil Neuhoff suggested inviting the US Geologic Survey to set up an information table. They wouldn't need a great deal of space and could be at the end of the cases opposite the Demonstration area. There will still be room for extra chairs for guests. He will coordinate with them.

Deana Ashton asked about adding extra space for more demonstrations in a quieter place. She was thinking about renting additional space in the Western Town building out back. There was much discussion about pros and cons of two buildings, security issues, etc. It was decided that we shouldn't try to expand into a bigger space until we can be sure of volunteers to work the extra events/demonstrations. We also discussed the raffle basket larger space and set up. Cheryl Link collected some baskets and filler paper for Deana Ashton to use as well. Deana Ashton will be getting raffle tickets that are very different from the ones used at the front door and door prize areas.

Deana Ashton also had good ideas for branded items that could be sold for the building fund. More discussion is needed in the near future.

We went over having the sign-up sheets available at the November general meeting. Cheryl Peterson needs to have the volunteer names after the January banquet so she has time to make the badges. Any late sign-ups can be added later as they come in. She does have extra materials, so she should be good to go. Cheryl Link passed out some material list sheets for making notes. They will come in very handy so we don't forget the little things at the last minute.

There was discussion about club members requesting sales space at the show. It was decided that they should sign up and get on the list for any future openings as all vendors do. One idea for member sales was to hold a tailgate type sales party in the church parking lot in the spring for all members to sell their goods.

Wheel of Fortune Table:

The Volunteer's Responsibility:

The volunteer is required to stay in the booth during their twohour shift. A chair will be provided behind the table for the volunteer to rest in. The volunteer will need to collect the money from the kids and then let the kids spin the wheel. The item on the table that matches the code on the wheel is the prize won. The volunteer will need to replace the item won after each spin of the wheel. The new items are stored under the table. It is beneficial to keep a variety of items on the table if at all possible. Having two people in the booth at one time makes the time pass quickly and creates a safe environment. Spending a two-hour shift lets you get to know your fellow club member. Please help the club by volunteering at one of the tables during the show.

Silent Auction Table:

The Volunteer's Responsibility:

The volunteer is required to stay behind the table during their two-hour shift. A chair will be provided behind the table for the volunteer to rest in. There will be signage on the table explaining to the public how the auction works. The volunteer will collect the money from the public at the end of each auction cycle. The cycle can run between 7 to 10 minutes, depending on the activity of the crowd. The volunteer will need to replenish the rock material on the plates after each auctioned item has been paid for. If the public has questions the volunteer will try to answer their questions to the best of their ability. Having four to six people working behind the tables makes the time pass quickly and creates a safe environment. Spending a two-hour shift lets you get to know your fellow club member.

General item for auction start at .25 cents and increase in





increments of at least .25 cents. There are special items that are worthy of a start of more than .25 cents. These special items will be attached to a sign marked Minimum Bid Starts At: \$X.XX. Items used at the silent auction table are usually kept in the blue tubs. These items may need to be replenished from year to year. These items are pencils, paper for bidding, plates to sit the items for auction on, a timer, and several water bottles to use to wet some of the rocks. Some rocks look nicer wet. Plastic bags to give to the auction winners to keep their items in are welcomed. Small card board boxes are very useful to give to the winners as well. A large variety of rocks are usually kept in buckets. A bucket opener is also kept in the blue tub. Great items to also go on the auction table are lapidary magazines plus other outdoor type magazines.

If a volunteer finds an item in a bucket they would like to have, they may step outside the silent auction table arena and bid from the outside right alongside the public. The money for a volunteer win must be given to a volunteer watching the item involving a volunteer bidding from the outside arena.

It is nice to have a plate or two set up on the side just for kids. Nice items for the kids can be small geodes, or small crystals of some sort. Polished stones or large sized snake skin agates work really well also.

It is always "best practice" to count back the change to the public when they are giving you money. If you are unsure of how much to give back always ask your partner for their confirmation of the money going back to the public. Please help the club by volunteering at one of the tables during the show.

Entry Ticket Sales Tables:

The Volunteer's Responsibility: The volunteer is required to stay at the front table during their twohour shift. A chair will be provided behind the table for the volunteer to rest



in. The volunteer will collect money from the public as they enter the fairground building and the show. There will be a price list of the age groups on the table. There will be two different colored raffle tickets to give to the public after they have paid their entry fee. One color will be for kids and one color will be for adults. The volunteer will explain to the guest they need to take their free raffle ticket over to the hospitality table and write their name and telephone number on one ticket. The guest needs to give the ticket with their name on it to the host at the hospitality table and keep the other half of the ticket in order to collect the hourly door prize drawings. We track how many people enter the building by the number ranges of the first ticket given out to the last ticket given out each day. Having two people working at both entry tables at one time makes the time pass quickly and creates a safe environment. Spending a two-hour shift lets you get to know your fellow club member. Please help the club by volunteering at one of the tables during the show.

Hospitality Table:

The Volunteer's Responsibility: The volunteer is required to stay at the table during their two-hour shift. A chair will be provided behind the table for the volunteer to rest in during slower traffic times. The volunteer will help instruct the guests on how to complete the door prize raffle ticket. The volunteer will explain to the guest they need to write their name and telephone number on



one ticket. The guest needs to give the ticket with their name on it to the host at the hospitality table and keep the other half of the ticket in order to collect an hourly winning door prize. The volunteer will help answer questions the guests might have concerning the show. There will be a variety of flyers for other club rock shows, club events, future field trips, club membership applications and other informational pamphlets for the public to take with them. The designated host will draw one ticket out of the accumulated tickets and announce the winning ticket number roughly once an hour for a door prize winner. The guest must be present to win the hourly door prize. Having several people working at the hospitality tables makes the time pass quickly and creates a safe environment. Spending a two-hour shift lets you get to know your fellow club member.

Garnet Dig Table:

IDAHO EARTH SCIENCE & LAPIDARY SPECIALTY LICENSE PLATE "GEM STATE PLATE" SPECIAL REQUEST



Our previous specialty license plate failed to successfully sell over 1,000 per year, the state requirements for continuation. Therefore, it was discontinued. The funds went to support K-6 Earth Science education statewide. Brent Stewart's school presentations are a vital part of this program.

I did a survey of vehicle registrants which shows most people are unaware of the programs supported by plate sales. I have a strong proposal prepared to address the Legislature next session. I am asking several changes be considered for our plate. It will bring bigger sales of special plates, make drivers aware of our program's beneficiaries, and justify costs of the plate. A consumer awareness campaign will accompany my efforts.

I am seeking a few old license plates with the full plate design, the Elk, Trout or Bluebird in particular. Any state plate with full design is welcomed also. I also need a few plates like college plates, skiing, rafting, cycling, or snowmobile designs on them (the design is to the left of the numbers). If you have an old set and could donate them, I would be grateful. These will be used for great purpose in an effort to reinstate our Earth Science & Lapidary Gem design license plate. This process is intended for early 2019. Our original design has been enhanced to cover the full plate with a design.

MANDRELS

Straight rod mandrels have a multitude of uses in helping to bend sheet and wire, and frequently we need a round rod for winding jump rings. Common sources for different sized rods are knitting needles, wooden dowels and clothes hangers. Metal rods can also be found in hardware stores and hobby shops.

But to get the right "look" in chain maile designs, you must have exactly the right size mandrel, and often those are not easy to find. Jewelry catalogs sell selections of straight rod mandrels for \$50 or more, but my choice is a set of transfer punches used in woodworking. The set has 28 sizes, from 3/32 inch to 1/2 inch, and is only about \$12. In the US it is available from Harbor Freight as item number #3577, and in Europe, it's available from MZS in the Netherlands as item number 250575




JUST SAY NO TO OPTIVISORS



Hobby collecting may be allowed for the first time in more than 20 years in Southern Utah Nat'l Monuments but the BLM needs to hear from the public by Nov 30th.

Grand Staircase-Escalante (GSENM) & Kanab-Escalante Planning Area (KEPA)

Would you like to be able to collect rocks, minerals, petrified wood and common invertebrate fossils on some of the lands that have been off limits to hobby collecting in Southern Utah since 1996?

Now is your chance to let the BLM know. The agency is proposing to restore hobby collecting but needs supporting comments from the public.

Southern California Paleontological Society (SCPS) has drafted a great <u>comment letter</u> that recreational users of public lands can support. Clubs, Societies and Individuals are invited to join SCPS and ask the BLM to restore casual collecting in GSENM-

KEPA. One authoritative letter supported by many organizations and individuals is effective! *(Boilerplates and form letters are not.)* **SCPS Deadline:** *November 27, 2018*

Individual personalized letters are great! But *instead* of **or** *in addition to* sending a personal letter **or** sending an over-used boilerplate letter (which is ineffective, by the way), please consider signing onto a well-crafted letter that has already been prepared. The **Southern California Paleontological Society** (SCPS) has written a great letter on behalf of the paleontological community and rockhounds.

Ask your club or regional federation or professional organization to sign onto it -- the strength of numbers will reinforce the authority of the message. We encourage everyone, especially members of **AFMS** affiliated clubs and its regional federations, to sign the **SCPS** letter.

There are three easy steps:Download the SCPS letter (available on the SDMG website at short URL: https:// goo.gl/Vj3zp4) Take the SCPS letter to your organization's board ASAP.Upon approval, send an email to Karol McQueary (socalpaleo@yahoo.com) with your club signature info to add to the letter. SCPS needs to hear back from you *no later than Nov. 27th*.Read more details about which of BLM's proposed alternatives is good for hobbyists in a print-friendly article on the SDMG website.


