SPECIAL MEETING for WORKSHOP JUNE 11, 2019

President Dana Robinson called the meeting to order at 7:20pm. Present: Dana Robinson, Willa Renkin, Deana Ashton, Ed and Deanna Moser, Christine Anderton and Sandy Blodgett (late) Subject of Meeting: Workshop discussion covered items related to the procedures and operation of the IGC Workshop.

Items Discussed:

Workshop Binder, contents and forms - The binder currently contains forms such as the Individual Release of Liability form, sign in sheets and documentation of fees for equipment usage. All agreed having these forms on file for each person visiting the workshop is critically important in order to protect the Club and the Membership as well as the individuals who visit the workshop and/or utilize equipment. After some discussion it was determined that while the forms themselves are fine more diligent effort needs to be made to properly implement them.

Workshop location, space restrictions and functionality - Nothing was firmly decided regarding the current workshop location. However, several points were brought up for thought and possible future discussion. Storage space for supplies and excess equipment and tools is limited, and personal items belonging to Brents family must be moved outside before the space can be used, also limiting access.

Workshop budget and financial items - In general, the budget and current system of accounting for the Workshop needs very little adjustments made. No problems were identified. Everyone agreed the Workshop was never intended to generate income for the IGC but also was not supposed to be a significant drain on the budget. After considering the options, it was determined the most efficient and fair way to cover expenses is a flat fee for shop time. A \$5.00 per visit fee (members and non-members) for equipment use will be implemented. Those in school (kindergarten – 12th) are free. Cutting fees still apply for slabbing on the big rock saws. This will allow us to do maintenance on machines.

Workshop volunteers and resources - With the increased interest in Workshops, volunteers need to be trained to help others. Deana A. has offered to assemble a board for the shop which will illustrate the entire process with examples step by step. If anyone has any ideas or could help, contact Deana and see what she may need to put this together.

The ROLE program was looked at and it was decided that to encourage interest in this program, workbooks for those interested in improving their skills will be made available at the Workshop.

Due to notification confusion, not all board members were at this meeting. Additional meeting(s) will be scheduled for further discussion.

Meeting adjourned approximately 8:30pm.


