

Black Light Display Case Room for Our 2019 Show:

This year I took the liberty to mix up the black light room floor plan for our February 2019 show.

In the past we occasionally would have some congestion in the back corner when people would walk in both directions around the inside of the black light room.

Normally our original floor plan allows for twenty black light display cases. We have filled all twenty cases the last several years. The challenge has been, I have for the last several years filled between six to seven of those display cases. I have enough material between my various rocks and depression glass to fill that many cases. My problem is it takes so much time to setup and take down that many cases.

This year I took out the center island that held eight of #7 which was enthe display cases. I kept the six cases on each side of the room plus added two cases to the back wall. I wanted to try a more open floor plan to allow the glow form each of the cases to be viable the minute you walked into the dark room. This change still allowed us to have fourteen display cases this year. I only entered two display cases which made this year so much more enjoyable for me.

MAKE A TEXTURE HAMMER

An inexpensive hammer can be easily turned into a great texturing tool by grinding a pattern of narrow lines into its face.

The tool I like to use to grind the pattern is a thin separating disc in a Foredom or Dremel. Be sure to hold the hammer and separating disc steady as you carve, and wear those safety glasses to protect your eyes.

For the pattern to work well, a major part of the face needs to be ground away leaving only small areas of high points. That way the high points will have enough force to emboss the pattern into your sheet metal.

My preference is to use small ball peen or cross peen hammers. They are quite inexpensive from tool dealers at swap meets and rock & mineral shows. There is no reason to buy an expensive hammer to experiment with creating your own textures.

And BTW, if you don't like the first pattern you create, simply file or grind it off and try again.

IDAHO LEGISLATURE PASSES HOUSE ONTO SENATE By Linda Barlow, IGC Federation Director

HJM005: Idaho requests federal legislature by Congress that when private lands are exchanged, purchased, or transferred to federal government that other lands within county be sold.

HO162: Creates interim committee of Legislative Council on federal lands issues. Adds \$10-15,000 cost. **HJM1008:** Requests Congress to release all wilderness study areas acreage listed as "not suitable for wilderness" by BLM to restore lands to public use. Idaho Legislature supports peer-reviewed scientific management to implement multiple-uses concept of public land use to protect forests, health, & reduce risk of harm to human health and environment.

SB1089: Prohibits interference with certain lands, highways, & navigable streams.

H75: Passed Senate: Removes reciprocity of OHV permits to other states-\$12/non-resident. Utah passed \$30 non-resident sticker last week.

SAFETY (Taken from AFMS Safety Chair, Ellery Borow) Does IGC have a way of addressing club members intentional and repeatedly disregards property owner's wishes? Does IGC rules, regulations, & bylaws have in place a reasonably comprehensive description of reasons to expel a member whose disrespectful collecting methods reflect badly on the club's field trip activities? Having specific expulsion guidelines makes it easier to point to rules that say "Sorry, but we just cannot accept misbehavior of such a nature on digs, or any other club activity."

It goes w/o saying, that having a calm, measured, & patient approach is helpful when discussing such matters with the owners of property that permit, or at least at one time, permitted collecting. Idaho Gem Club By-Laws state:

ARTICVLE XVIII: Expulsion or Withdrawal From & Restoration to Membership

SECTION 2: A member may be expelled from the Corporation for:

Any flagrant or continued violation of any of the provisions of the By-Laws or Operating Procedures.

Any improper or unlawful conduct that violates the rights and privileges of other members.

Such expulsion must be by no less than a 45 vote of the Board of Directors present at a meeting duly called to consider the matter. The time and place of the meeting called to consider the expulsion shall be given in writing to the accused five days prior thereto.

This was the most interesting part of my editorship. It always managed to get my creative juices flowing especially with the feedback from the membership.
