



AFMS

- 1. New AFMS President, David Wayment 2019-2020, from Florida. Encourages use of the AFMS DVD's and VHS programs for the clubs at no cost.
- 2. AFMS Certified Judges training classes to be held in conjunction with NFMS Annual Meeting in Ogden, Utah, tentatively April 9-12, 2020.
- 3. Cheryl Neary is new Central Office Administrator who has taken the responsibility of maintaining the mailing list.
- 4. AFMS Endowment Fund is taking donations, 5 lb. limit and minimum value of \$75, and selling tickets, \$5 per ticket and \$20 for 5. Tickets obtainable from NFMS respresentative, Judy Allison, jall@eotnet.net.
- 5. Rockhounds of the Year nominations were written up by regions including IGC nomination.
- 6. AFMS Website Contestant must be 1st or 2nd place in NFMS, Regional Federation. Contest page is http://www.amfed.org/web/websitecontest.htm.
- 7. Annual Recreational Rockhound Rendezvous at Quartzsite, AZ, has been there for the past 50 years. This town has a unique Wild West history. During the 1850's, a settler built a fort to protect his water from Native American attacks. For a while, the town was a stage coach stop. The army brought in 77 camels from the Middle East, along with their camel drivers, to help with building projects, especially the desert roads. Camels could carry 2-3 times the weight loads of the army's mules and could survive on less water. Once the Civil War began, the army's projects with the camels were dropped and the town became a ghost town. The memory of the project still exists today with a memorial in the Quartzsite Pioneer Cemetery of a stone pyramid made of local rouch rock and mortar with a standing camel on top and the nickname of one of the famous camel drivers who retired in town, known as Hi Jolly.

IDAHO RECREATIONAL COUNCIL:

I will be attending the yearly meeting on January 11, 2020, for the club.

REMINDER: Idaho Legislature is in session starting today, January 7, 2020. This means that there will be an increase in notices regarding any legislation that I feel pertains to the club's activities and our membership carrying out their hobby of recreational rockhounding. If you are not interested in receiving these notices which pertain to our ability to function as recreational rockhounds, please inform me. Thank you.

New Oregon Boat Law: 2020 law now requires all boaters, even non-residents, to have a state boating education card to legally boat in the state (motorboats over 10 hp).


Clarification by state officials: The education card will not be needed by Idaho boaters on border waters since Idaho does not require boater education. They mentioned that once a boater enters the Powder River arm of Brownlee, that would be considered "in Oregon" and not a border water. If your state doesn't require boating safety education, you will need to take Oregon's mandatory boater education course and purchase the Oregon card before operating on Oregon waters. If Idaho residents take an Idaho course, that will work for Oregon only if you remember your card while boating in Oregon!

ROCKHOUND SOAPBOX

Recreational Rockhounding as Defined in the United States Code of Federal Regulations

43 CFR § 8365.1-5 Property and resources,

- (a) On all public lands, unless otherwise authorized, no person shall;
 - Willfully deface, disturb, remove or destroy any personal property, or structures, or any scientific, cultural, archaeological or historic resource, natural object or area;
 - (2) Willfully deface, remove or destroy plants or their parts, soil, rocks or minerals, or cave resources, except as permitted under paragraph (b) or (c) of this paragraph; or
 - (3) Use on the public lands explosive, motorized or mechanical devices, except metal detectors, to aid in the collection of specimens permitted under paragraph (b) or (c) of this paragraph.
- (b) Except on developed recreation sites and areas, or where otherwise prohibited and posted, it is permissible to collect from the public lands reasonable amounts of the following for noncommercial purposes:
 - (1) Commonly available renewable resources such as flowers, berries, nuts, seeds, cones and leaves;

- (2) Nonrenewable resources such as rock and mineral specimens, common invertebrate and common plant fossils, and semiprecious gemstones;
- (3) **Petrified wood** as provided under subpart 3622 of this title;

Subpart 3622—Free Use of Petrified Wood

- (4) Mineral materials as provided under subpart 3604; and Subpart 3604—Free Use of Mineral Materials
- (5) Forest products for use in campfires on the public lands. Other collection of forest products shall be in accordance with the provisions of Group 5500 of this title.

PART 5500-NONSALE DISPOSALS; GENERAL

(c) The collection of renewable or nonrenewable resources from the public lands for sale or barter to commercial dealers may be done only after obtaining a contract or permit from an authorized officer in accordance with part 3600 or 5400 of this chapter.



DEPTH GAUGE FOR DRILLING

Sometimes you need to drill a number of holes all to the same depth. One quick and easy way to do this is to wind some tape around the drill bit so that the tape just touches the part surface when the hole is deep enough.

You can set the depth either by measuring from the tip of the drill to the tape or by drilling to the correct depth, leaving the bit in the hole, and wrapping tape around the bit at the surface level.

Note that a little extra tape left free on the end will blow away debris from the drilling.



CUTTING A BOLT

Whenever you have to cut a threaded bolt shorter, it's often difficult to get the nut to thread back onto it. And the smaller the bolt, the more difficult it is to restore any distorted threads. The problem is easily solved with the use of a nut. Here's how I do it.

First, screw a nut onto the bolt before cutting it. Grip the bolt by the threaded section that is to be sawed off. Then saw the bolt to the desired length, taper the end with sandpaper or file, and unscrew the nut from the bolt.

Unscrewing the nut over the freshly cut end of the bolt will straighten out any damage that sawing and filing did to the threads. Gripping the bolt by the piece to be sawed off localizes any crushing damage to the piece that will be thrown away.
