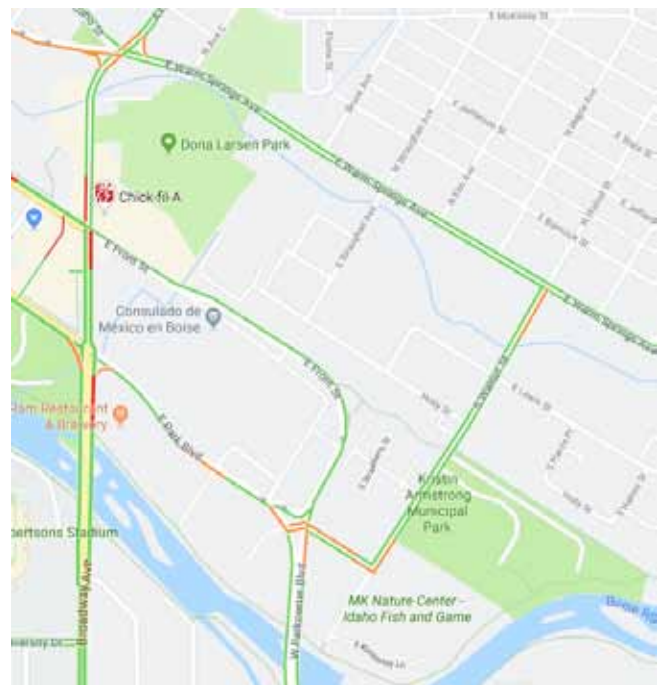

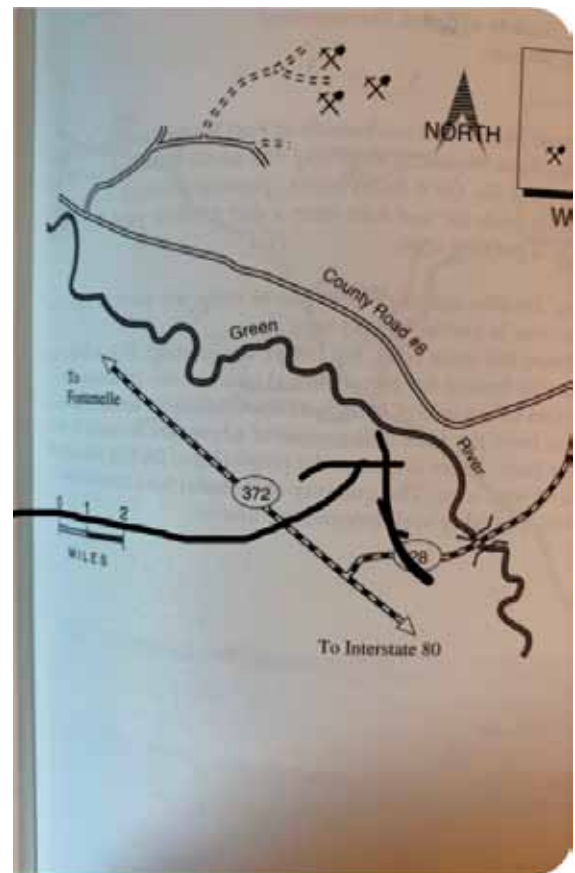
JUNE FIELD TRIP

The first field trip for June will be on Saturday June 13th and Sunday, June 14th. It will be to our Beacon Hill claim. The trip was rescheduled to a later date. We will meet at the Rest Area just over the Oregon border outside of Ontario, at 8:00 am, leaving at 8:30 am.

It is one of our more popular field trips each year. Hope to see you out there!

FEDERATION FIELD TRIP

There will be field trips on June 12-15 with dry camping at the dig site. The first two days we'll dig for Blue Forest petrified wood. On the 14th there will be a trip to dig Fish Fossils at Kemmerer, WY. This is a fee dig of \$65 per day. On the 14th you can dig wood or explore the area. See the map below for directions. When you turn off of Rd. 8, drive between the pink wire flags all the way to camp.



If you're coming from west on I-80, exit at Green River exit 83 and go north on Hwy. 372. Go 27 miles and turn right on WY 28, go 6.7 miles and turn left on CR 8. Go 11.3 miles at the top of the hill and turn right. From then on follow along driving between wire flags that I will have put out going about 4.7 miles to the camp.

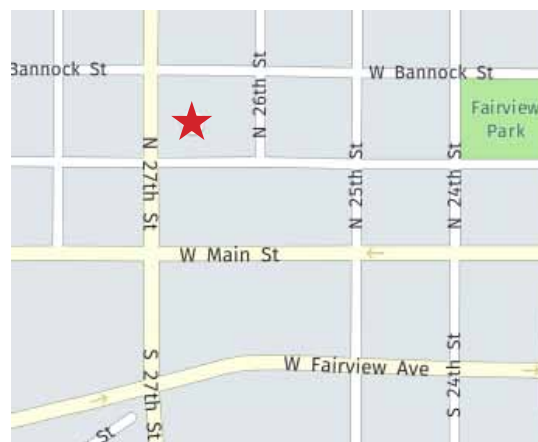

AFMS Juniors Program Chair, Jim Brace-Thompson:

Jim dressed as California State Fossil, "Smilodon", the saber-tooth cat; also, known as "Smiley Don"! Pictures of these two old fossils can be found on the AFMS website.

AFMS Scholarship President, Sandie Fender: AFMS Scholarship Foundation is a separate indemnity from the AFMS with the purpose of financially aiding young men and women in acquiring an education in the field of Earth Sciences. This foundation runs on donations only; she suggested each club donated 50 cents per member. This Fund is perpetual, meaning, it uses only the income from the Fund to finance Scholarships. It provides a single year scholarship grant of \$4,000 each year to two students selected by each of the six participating Regional Federations. That's a total of 12 graduate students each year. As of 2011, 566 students have received financial educational assistance since inception in 1964 with the monetary amount of \$1,540,650. The article describes how the awards have grown and the selection process.

AFMS Bulletin Editors Advisor Chair, Mark Nelson:

Mark describes how to remove end hyphens with examples. He describes use of Full Justification button in Microsoft Publisher, Word, and in Word Perfect. AFMS Land Use Policy:

1. Adherence to AFMS Code of Ethics.
2. Encourages members and clubs to be involved with issues affecting field collecting of minerals and fossils.
3. Encourages members and clubs to join and support ALAA.
4. AFMS receives yearly reports from ALAA.
5. AFMS endorses multiple use of public lands.
6. Wilderness and monument designations are inconsistent with principle multiple land use.
7. AFMS believes laws, regulations, and rules should be designed to allow freest possible access to all public lands and minimal restrictions on recreational collecting of minerals, fossils, gemstone materials and other naturally occurring materials.
8. The right to collect should be protected by statute.
9. AFMS urges members achieve a good working relationship with all government authorities to improve public image of recreational collectors.

ALAA President, Shirley Leeson: Extended concern for rockhounds, urging precautions for safety and health.

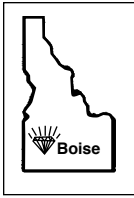
I have started a Google Groups for receiving Public Access Information. This was done as I can no longer send group mailings greater than 10 without getting blocked by Gmail! I sent members an invitation and anyone who responded by 5/4/2020 was included on the list. I will invite monthly our new members or those requesting addition to the list.

Items sent this month include:

1. Owyhee public information release requesting all users of public land and off-roading to BE KIND to private property owners, this is part of our rockhounding AFMS Code of Ethics.
2. Notice of Valley County Public Hearing regarding Waterways Ordinance. Deadline May 20, 2020. www.co.valley.id.us/departments/commissioners/meetings-minutes/commissioner-meeting-minutes. Covers all waterways including Deadwood Reservoir, Granite Lake, Horsethief Reservoir, Lake Cascade, Little Payette Lake, Upper Payette Lake, Warm Lake, and specific reaches of the North Fork of the Payette River.
3. Access to Campgrounds is limited on the Payette National Forest. See the Payette National Forest website for further information.
4. Forest Closures of Payette National Forest are noted with additional information available by calling Forest Supervisor's Office @ 208-634-0700. Access is limited to roads clear of snow. Campgrounds closed until Memorial Day weekend or early June based on snow levels preventing access including Goose Lake Road, Lick Creek Road, and Warren Wagon Rd.

NOTE: About 2 weeks ago, Mike and I drove out near Warm Lake with snow levels still at waist deep preventing any rock hunting and inability to reach stream beds. Below Cascade, the rivers were flowing fast and accessible.

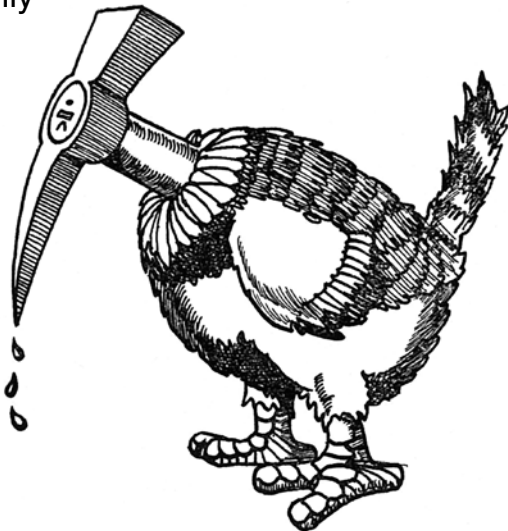
