FLOURESCENT MINERALS

What is a Fluorescent Mineral?

All minerals have the ability to reflect light. That is what makes them visible to the human eye. Some minerals have an interesting physical property known as “fluorescence.” These minerals have the ability to temporarily absorb a small amount of light and an instant later release a small amount of light of a different wavelength. This change in wavelength causes a temporary color change of the mineral in the eye of a human observer.

The color change of fluorescent minerals is most spectacular when they are illuminated in darkness by ultraviolet light (which is not visible to humans) and they release visible light.

How Many Minerals Fluoresce in UV Light?

Most minerals do not have a noticeable fluorescence. Only about 15% of minerals have a fluorescence that is visible to people, and some specimens of those minerals will not fluoresce. Fluorescence usually occurs when specific impurities known as “activators” are present within the mineral. These activators are typically cations of metals such as: tungsten, molybdenum, lead, boron, titanium, manganese, uranium, and chromium. Rare earth elements such as europium, terbium, dysprosium, and yttrium are also known to contribute to the fluorescence phenomenon. Fluorescence can also be caused by crystal structural defects or organic impurities.

In addition to “activator” impurities, some impurities have a dampening effect on fluorescence. If iron or copper are present as impurities, they can reduce or eliminate fluorescence. Furthermore, if the activator mineral is present in large amounts, that can reduce the fluorescence effect.

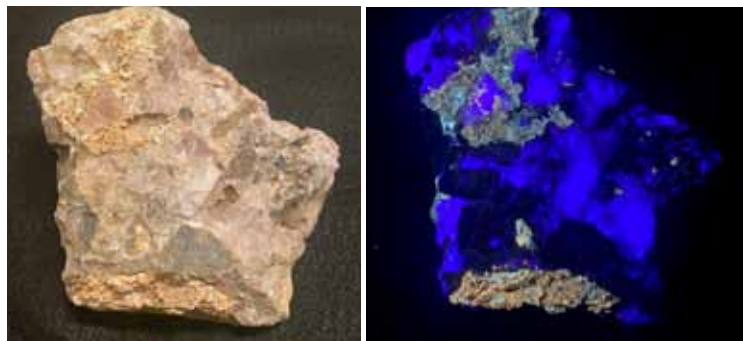
Most minerals fluoresce a single color. Other minerals have multiple colors of fluorescence. Calcite has been known to fluoresce red, blue, white, pink, green, and orange. Some minerals are known to exhibit multiple colors of fluorescence in a single specimen. These can be banded minerals that exhibit several stages of growth from parent solutions with changing compositions. Many minerals fluoresce one color under shortwave UV light and another color under longwave UV light.

Where to Find Fluorescent Minerals in Idaho

Idaho is not known as a hotspot for collecting fluorescent minerals like New Jersey, Arizona, or Greenland. That could all change as the recent availability of UV flashlights at reasonable prices makes hunting for fluorescent minerals more accessible. My son and I have discovered several new fluorescent mineral localities near McCall, for instance, with the aid of these lights (one of which we have under claim). For those who want to get started, here is a brief list of some Idaho fluorescent mineral localities:

Daugherty Gulch: This classic locale near Challis is known for its abundant fluorite. Most of the fluorite fluoresces bright blue under LW, and diligent searching can produce multi-color LW specimens

where the fluorite is accompanied by cream or orange fluorescing calcite (along with red fluorescing lichens).

Spar Canyon: Near the East Fork of the Salmon River west of Challis, the barite from this classic locale fluoresces a variety of pastel hues under SW and LW.

Rabbit Springs: Located just north of Jackpot, Nevada along Highway 93, the thundereggs found at this site often fluoresce green under LW.

China Hat: Rhyolites at this small volcanic center north of Soda Springs are reported to fluoresce orange.

Peacock Mine: This historic copper mine in the Seven Devils is the type locality (place from which a mineral is first described) of powellite (CaMoO_4), which always fluoresces a cream color under SW.

Stibnite area: The general area around the stibnite mine has a lot of potential for fluorescent minerals. Of particular interest are the numerous tungsten prospects that produce scheelite (CaWO_4), which always fluoresces a bright blue-white color under SW.

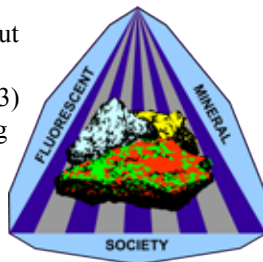
Owyhee Front: Much of the petrified wood found in the Owyhees fluoresces orange LW, and the hyalite opal that occurs there often exhibits a bright green color under LW.

Join the Fluorescent Mineral Society

Are you interested in learning more about fluorescent minerals? A great resource is the Fluorescent Mineral Society (FMS), a 501c(3) non-profit organization devoted to promoting the study and enjoyment of fluorescent minerals. Organized in 1971, FMS boasts hundreds of members from over 40 U.S. states and a dozen foreign countries. FMS members have been at the forefront of both discoveries of new fluorescent minerals and localities and in developing cost-effective UV lamp technologies necessary to enjoy fluorescent minerals. Members receive two publications: *UV Waves*, a bi-monthly magazine with topical articles of interest to the fluorescent mineral community, and the *Journal of the Fluorescent Mineral Society*, a more technical annual publication dealing with the science of fluorescent minerals. FMS also organizes events across the country, including field excursions, shows, and social meetups. Most recently, FMS organized the largest exhibition of fluorescent minerals in history as part of the Tucson Gem and Mineral Society annual show. For those that use Facebook, FMS sponsors a group called “Fluorescent Minerals” that receives numerous daily posts with high quality photos of fluorescent minerals along with discussions of various UV light options and other technical aspects (it is a great place for beginners to get their questions answered). Phil Neuhoff Biography

Phil Neuhoff has been a member of the Idaho Gem Club since he first moved to the Treasure Valley. He gained his love of rocks as a young child growing up in eastern Iowa after he learned about dinosaurs in school. Although the rocks there were too old to contain dinosaur fossils, Paleozoic invertebrate fossils were abundant and he went collecting as often as he could. The area also was an old lead and zinc mining district, and he quickly came to love minerals as well. After a brief stint as a biology major in college, Phil decided to convert his passion for geology into a career and earned a B.S. in Geology from the University of Iowa and a Ph.D. in Geological and Environmental Science from Stanford University. He and his family left California when he took a position as a professor of Geological Sciences at the University of Florida. The family decided to leave Florida for Idaho in 2008, and since that time Phil has worked as a geologist serving geothermal and mining companies. He and his family also operate Rock Flat Minerals, a small mining and mineral business that sells gems, minerals, rocks and fossils online and at selected events in Idaho (and is known for its portable running-water flume where customers can process custom-made ore bags for gem stones). Phil has been an active leader in the rock-hounding hobby since coming to Idaho, serving the Idaho Gem Club as Scholarship Chairman, a Director, Second Vice President, and President. More recently he has accepted a leadership role in the Fluorescent Mineral Society, where he coordinates the Research Chapter, serves as a director, and edits their scientific journal.

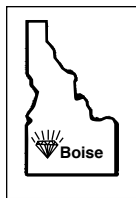

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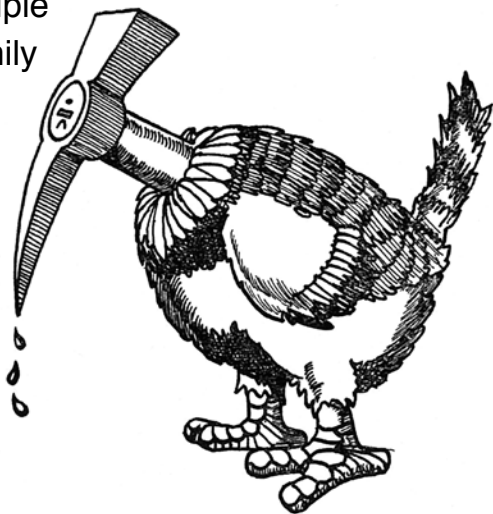
