

SCHOLARSHIP WINNER

The winner of the Idaho Gem Club Scholarship this year is Kaiya Schmidt. She is a junior at Boise State University studying Geosciences. She is very interested in the Landslide Hazards Program with the USGS. Below is her essay. We will be scheduling a short presentation with her for the spring. Congratulations, Kaiya!

As a student at Boise State University, I am surrounded by professionals in the geosciences who truly embody what it means to be a geologist. I look up to my professors, who provide me with resources and guidance that inspire me to pursue my own career in geology. My dream is to work for the United States Geological Survey (USGS) in the Landslide Hazards Program.

In my junior year of high school, I took my first geology class with Erin Stutzman. Erin rekindled the fascination for geology I had as a child. Months later, Erin took our class on a tour to Boise State University's Geoscience Department, where I later sat in on Kerri Wepner's GEOS 101 lecture. That class period is when I discovered my fascination with landslides.

Landslides are an interesting phenomenon — I often feel that people forget they exist until they happen. The USGS has been around for many years, and as a result, it has gained the public's trust. People fear what they don't know, and the USGS has made its data available to anyone. Along with the data come articles and interpretations made by professionals. These professionals have translated said data into something everyone can understand, making essential information about our changing Earth accessible.

Before pursuing all of my goals, my next step involves attending graduate school. I hope to attend the University of Utah, studing in the Geohazards Research Department under Jeffe Moore. The University of Utah is a phenomenal school with highly accredited geoscience professors. Depending on what the job market looks like after I graduate with my master's degree, I may go on to pursue my PhD or Doctorate. Although this is many years away, I am ambitious in starting my own research and contributing to academia.

With my burning ambition for the future of geosciences, I hope to not only serve my peers, but also to educate and protect the public from geologic hazards. My education is the first step to achieving these goals, and this scholarship represents an investment in my future as both a scientist and an educator. I am determined to make my mark in geosciences, impacting both the geohazards research and the communities that rely on this essential information.

We also need a good crew for setting up the tables, Black Light Room and Display Cases. Please get involved and help us out. This show is a regional favorite and we always receive a big turnout. This is a fun way to learn more about rocks, meet fellow members and the community. Sign-up sheets will be available at meetings. You may also call the chairpeople to get added on the lists.

Our show will be held February 21 and 22, 2026 at Expo Idaho.

Show Set Up at Expo Idaho We need volunteers to unload the trailers and set up the entire show, including display cases, dealer tables, blacklight room, demonstration area tables, and tables for the various Club Events. Please pitch in by giving a couple of hours helping the club bring this great Gem Show to life.

Saturday, February 21 10 am-6 pm. Show opens at 10 am.

All stations need full volunteer schedules.

Sunday, February 22 10 am-5 pm. Show is open.

Sunday at 5 pm-8 pm Show. Tear Down.

Volunteers needed to disassemble the show and load everything back into trailers. We can't do it without you!

Members are encouraged to contact Rick Corbett to reserve a display case where you can show off your treasures to the public. You may install your case during the afternoon on Friday. You must have the glass door fronts on and secured by Saturday's door opening at 10 am.



ROCK TUMBLING

We are in need of more tumbled rocks for the show! Please run your tumblers steadily so we can have as many polished stones as possible for our grab bags. Each 5-gal. bucket turned in will earn you \$125.00 to offset the cost of grit. The more you turn in, the more you earn!

If you need rocks to tumble, just ask any club officer and we will get you some. We will be scheduling the Grab Bag Stuffing party for sometime in mid-January, so keep tumbling and/or sewing grab bags to put them in.

TUMBLING INSTRUCTIONS

ROTARY ROCK TUMBLERS

These instructions will work with any rotary rock tumbler. The specific measurements provided for abrasive materials (grit and polish) is for 3 pound barrel capacity machines. You can adjust the media amounts with the inserted chart. All of the guidelines and approaches are good practice for any rock tumbling project.

Four Step Process

Rotary tumblers use a four step tumbling process:

- Coarse Grind
- 2. Medium Grind
- 3. Pre-polish
- 4. Polish

Between each of the four steps remove, thoroughly rinse your rocks, and clean out the barrel. Everything must be cleaned thoroughly to remove all grit or rock debris. This is really important as the coarser grits from one step will act adversely in the next steps, scratching your rocks. As always, it is advised not to throw used grit down a drain because plumbing will be damaged/plugged. Use a bucket and a screen to collect used grit and slurry. Do not use an aluminum colander or pan to rinse your stones as it may mark them.

Good Rock Selection

The tumbling process starts with good rock selection. Pick rocks that are of near the same hardness. Use a mixture of small and large stones, but mainly larger ones. The smaller stones will help the grinding action. Gather enough rocks to fill your



barrel between 2/3 and 3/4 full. Too many stones and they will roll too short a distance for effective action.

Step One (Coarse Grind)

The goal of this step is for all surfaces of your rocks to be well-rounded. Place rocks in the tumbler and add the 60/90 silicon carbide grit. You are looking to round your rocks in this step over 7 to 10 days. The grit to rock ratio in this step is 2 tablespoons of grit per pound of rock. Add water until it is about 1 inch below your top layer of rocks. Seal the barrel and invert it to check for leaks. Once the tumbling starts watch for a few minutes to be sure there are no leaks. At the early days of this step, check daily on the progress by opening and inspecting the barrel. If the barrel appears to physically swell, open it to vent the buildup of gas which may naturally occur, be prepared with safety glasses and precautions for that. You can also add a teaspoon of baking soda and start with room temperature water to prevent a buildup of gases. Examine your rocks and slurry (the grit and water now mixed with some rock trailings). If it seems thick enough to impede the smooth tumbling of your rocks, thin it with a small amount of water. Once you see rounding has occurred for most or all of your rocks, you can move on to step 2.

Step Two (Final Grind)

In this step your purpose is to conclude the shaping process to your satisfaction. You will be removing any declensions and pitting that may have been present after step one. This step usually takes 7 to 10 days also. Remove any rocks that are not responding sufficiently or have evolved to an unattractive shape. Put your cleaned rocks in the barrel again, and add a 120/220 silicon carbide grit at 2 tablespoons per pound of load. Add water up to the bottom of the top layer of rocks and add a pinch of baking soda. Seal and tumble as before. Your slurry should be a little thinner than in the last step varying with the softness or fragility of materials you are processing. Your goal again in this step is to see that all the scratches from the first step are ground away and the rocks have a smooth, matte finish.

Step Three (Pre-polish)

In this step the goal is to make the rocks extremely smooth. As before, put cleaned rocks in the cleaned and fresh barrel to make a full load. Use a pre-polish of either silicon carbide 500 or aluminum oxide 500 for this step, about 1 tablespoon per pound of load, and then add water up to the bottom of the top layer of rock. Tumble time here is up to 7 days, with more checking slurry consistency and general progress every day or two. For softer rocks, you may need to do a second pre-polish step or just keep them in a little longer. At the end of this step it is most crucial to really clean the rocks and barrel. It will be more difficult because you are using a finer grit. This is so important because any grit can ruin the progress of your rocks in the final polish step.

Step Four (Polish)

By this time your rocks are looking pretty good and ready for that lasting final shine. You have been extra diligent on cleaning the rocks and barrel. Place your rocks in the tumbler and add Aluminum Oxide Polish, about 1 tablespoon per pound of rock. Step four takes up to seven days, but be sure to check the rocks as you are proceeding because some will be finished earlier. The best check for

completed rocks is that they look now as they would if wet. Once that is the case you are done with this step. One final detail, it is best to clean up now by cleaning your equipment thoroughly before everything dries and encrusts. Now you'll be ready for your next project with rock tumbling.

Media Amount Adjustment Chart (for generic tumbler)

Some tumblers require different amounts. Check the instructions for your specific tumbler.

This chart is a general guideline to grit measurements. The correct amount of grit and polish to use will vary by project task. Hard rocks and particularly rough rocks may require additional grit to be added at some point in the process.

Since most people don't have an ounce measure scale around, the following is an easy way to arrive at ounces and is based on standard measuring spoons.

1 oz. coarse grit = 4 level tsps. 1 oz. medium grit = 4 level tsps. 1 oz. fine grit = 4 level tsps. 1 oz. polishing grit = 8 level tsps.



GRAB BAG PATTERN


For those who want to sew up some Grab Bags for the February show, here are the instructions. The Grab Bag Stuffing Party is coming up in mid-January.


Cut out the fabric to 6 1/2" x 9" size. Press down 1/2" on the top edge of each strip. Following the pattern below, fold over the outer edge of the top hem and make the dog ears, then place your drawstring under the hem (but over the dog ears). You may want to place a few pins in the edge of the hem to make sure it stays put before you sew. Then sew the seam.

Once the hem is stitched down (be careful not to catch the drawstring in the stitching), sew the bag, beginning at the opening where you've placed the "dog ears". Stop the needle at about 1/4" from the bottom of the bag, turn and sew to the end. Then cut threads and turn the bag right-side out.

The strings should be made of any heavy cord, yarn or ribbon cut into approximately 14" lengths. Rug yarn is good, strong and colorful. Before sewing, press the folds with a hot iron or crease with the fingers to make the job easier.

Ronald "Ron" Ridenour

Ronald "Ron" Ridenour was born on Jan. 8, 1942, in Hermiston, OR, to Virgil L. and Velna

Ridenour. He was the second of five children, joining his older sister Donna, and later welcoming brothers Robert, Larry, Dennis (who passed in infancy) and Marvin. From a young age, Ron was known for his mischievous curiosity, kindness, and sense of responsibility. He was deeply devoted to his family, always watching over his siblings and helping his mother with anything she needed.

Ron began working at the age of twelve, bucking hay and bussing tables. His strong work ethic and reliability became hallmarks of his character throughout his life. After graduating from high school in Boise in 1960, he worked locally for two years before marrying his high school sweetheart, Camille Leonard, on February 10, 1961. Together, they built a marriage that lasted more than sixty-four years, marked by love, humor, and unwavering partnership.

Ron and Camille raised two daughters, Melanie and Julie, and together they shared countless adventures as a family. Whether camping, fishing, or simply spending time together, Ron's joy came from being with those he loved.

Ron served in the Air National Guard for 12 years before joining the Boise Fire Department, where he served for seven years. His sense of duty and courage as a Fireman and Guardsman reflected the same spirit of service he carried throughout his life.

Ron then attended Boise Junior College and later transferred to Utah State University in Logan, Utah, where he completed his Bachelor of Science degree in Fisheries Management. After graduation, Ron worked as a fish biologist at the Avoca Fish Hatchery and managing Monroe Reservoir in Indiana. When he returned to Idaho, Ron transitioned careers again, becoming a truck driver like his father. For the next twenty years, he traveled the highways with professionalism and pride until his retirement.

Outside of work, Ron's passions reflected his boundless curiosity and mechanical skill. He was a classic car enthusiast, a problem-solver, and a member of the Idaho Gem Club, where he served as president in 2004.

Ron passed away peacefully on October 21, 2025, surrounded by the love of his family. He was a devoted husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, brother, and friend. He is survived by his beloved wife, Camille; daughter Melanie (Jason) Wills; sister Donna (Frank) Adcock; and many grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his parents, brothers Robert, Larry, Dennis and Marvin, and his youngest daughter, Julie.

Show Report: The sign-up sheets for the various jobs at the show are on the front table. We need all the volunteers we can get to run the show. We can also use people to do demonstrations on making cabachons.

Program Report: The program tonight will be a presentation on Botryoidal Plume Agate from the Graveyard Point area by Sandy Blodgett. Silica is the main mineral in botryoidal agate, with sagenite and rutile hematite needles occasionally trapped in the agate. To clean, use a pressure wash after soaking for a bit. You can also use an air blower and a wire brush. Using Iron Out first takes out the bad hue from the rock, but don't leave it in too long. You can also use oxalic acid in hot water — be sure to wear a mask. The purer silica solution makes a shinier surface; included minerals made the agate darker.

We will be having auctions at the end of the meetings in November and December to help offset the cost of the banquet.

Elections: All directors that are at the end of their term have agreed to continue on the board. Anyone can still be nominated from the floor at the November meeting. If so we will have an election.

Banquet: Tickets are now available for our Annual Banquet. It is on January 20, 2026. Tickets will be available at the meetings and at Stewart's Gem Shop, as well.

Old Business: The Project of the Year Contest is coming up in December. There are entries for adults and juniors in this great competition. The winner in each category receives their name on our plaque and a display case in our annual show to show off your entry. Anyone can win!

Our December Christmas Workshop will be on Dec. 20 and 21, 10 am to 4 pm both days. It is a pot luck, so bring a dish to share. There will also be wirewrap classes with a minimal charge.
